It is rumored in San Francisco that the steam propeller William Taber, which was built in Baltimore in 1857, and has a registered tonnage of nearly 2000, will be run by Mr. Luning on the route between San Francisco and Portland, in opposition to the line of steamships owned and operated by Henry Villard and for which Goodall, Perkins & Co. are agents.

The new steamer lately built here has at last received her machinery, her name, and after a trial trip last Wednesday afternoon will be down here to-day or to-morrow, and start into business at once.

Mail Lettings.

The O. R. & N. Co. have the contract for the four years beginning July 1st, '82 to carry the mail from Portland to Astoria, six times a week; the annual compensation being \$5000.

Across the river McCoy brings the weekly mail from Knappton to this place for \$180 a year; and takes the weekly mail from Knappton to Oysterville for \$470.

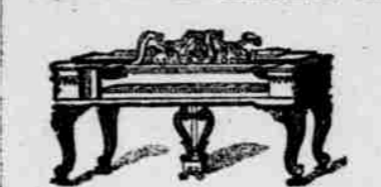
