—St. Patrick's day will be duly commemorated next Friday in Portland.

—There is a good deal of what may be called "amateur politics" going on now-a-days.

—Now it is in order to inquire when the Republican primaries in this county are to be held.

—The Wee Fo sails from Hong Kong to-day with 550 Chinamen, tea, rice, etc., for Portland.

—It must not be forgotten that Sheriff Twombly is, at present, tax collector, and the days go by.

—The City of Chester arrived in yesterday morning. She discharged 150 tons of freight for this place.

—The extreme cold in Union county has frozen the ears of some of the inhabitants and caused sundry other annoyances.

—The Spokane Times complains that the sawdust is spoiling the sport of fishing in the Spokane river, and the trout are getting scarce.

—Owing to the scarcity of salmon in barrels and half barrels prices have gone up considerably, half barrels being quoted at \$5 @ \$6.

Lawrence, the man who deserted his wife recently at Portland and eloped with Miss Nellie Sloan, whom he married at this place, telegraphs from Bern Switzerland, for his injured wife to join him and asks whether he can write to Portland. Mrs. Lawrence replied that he could write but she would never join him.

—A question of veracity between Miss Earle of Portland and Geo. France makes it unpleasant for both parties. He claims that she is his wife and she denies it. Complaint having been made that he had arrived in Portland and with "blood in his eye," he was arrested there on Monday night and so endeth the first innings.

—California is going into the business of canning fruit on a bigger scale than ever this season. It is a good business, and, like salmon, the market is unlimited. Whenever the two points of a sure supply and cheaper freight can be satisfactorily fixed, Astoria will go into that business and find it as profitable as salmon or lumber. Some of the California fruit statistics sound like our figures on salmon. One San Jose firm put up \$60,000 cases of fruit last year, and had orders for 100,000 more on their books at the close of the season.

What He Did.

At a meeting of the Portland Board of Trade last Monday evening, D. P. Thompson said that he had little to add to the letter mailed shortly before his departure. He believed that Congress would make a liberal appropriation for improving the Columbia river bar provided Col. Gillespie's report two years ago was adopted. If the committee carried out the views of the New York board of engineers no appropriation need be expected. One thing was certain, if any sum is to be voted, it will be large. Concerning the signal station, Congressman George and he called on Gen. Hazen, who readily agreed to change the line from Tillamook rock to Cape Disappointment.

When he called attention to the need of six stake lights on the Columbia river as suggested by Capt. Bolles, the chief of the lighthouse service cheerfully recommended an appropriation of \$3000, and the committee adopted the recommendation.

Mr. Kimball, chief of the life saving station, at his request, has instructed Capt. Harris, of the Fort Canby station to employ a temporary crew until June 1st, and will ask Congress to make an appropriation large enough to maintain a permanent crew.
