Nevada and Oregon. Under and by virtue of an execution issued out of the district court, Sheriff Walker, says the Reno Gazette of the 18th of February, sold all the timber, ties, lumber, rolling stock, tools, and 2,725 shares of capital stock of the Nevada & Oregon railroad company belonging to Thomas Moore, the contractor, for \$9,000. The locomotive, stock and tools were bid in by Manning & Berry for \$3,000. C. A. Bragg & Co. bought the lumber, ties and timber for \$2,000, and H. J.
