Washington Letter.

From our Regular Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 14, 1882. THE appearance in print of the letter written by General Garfield to Secretary Chase in 1863 has created a sensation here, and it is regarded unfortunate that the publication was made. General Garfield at that time was chief of staff to General Rosecrans, who commanded the army of the Cumberland. The letter criticises the policy of General Rosecrans as one of 'inexcusable' procrastination, and the writer expresses his intention, if the inaction continued much longer, to ask to be sent somewhere where he could be part of a working army. General Rosecrans, who is now a member of the House from California, says he very much regrets the appearance of such a letter, more on account of the injury to the memory of Garfield than on his own account. The point made is that, occupying confidential relations to his superior officer, writing such a letter, whether its charges were true or not, was a breach of faith and subject to court martial. There appears to be little if any doubt of the genuineness of the letter, and the friends of the late President are not pleased that it has been made public. He is not here to defend or explain, and the inevitable result of the publication will be to stir up bad feeling and give currency to gossip, idle and otherwise. Already gossip on the subject has commenced and it is asserted that at the time of General Rosecrans's removal from the command of the Army of the Cumberland General Garfield, who had then come to Washington to take his seat in Congress, expressed great regret and was loud in his praise of Rosecrans as an able military chieftain. Afterwards, it is alleged, President Lincoln, when informed of General Garfield's expressions, remarked with much surprise that it was principally on account of General Garfield's statements and representations that General Rosecrans had been removed. It is charged that this letter was published in the interest of Fitz John Porter, against whose restoration to the army Garfield was thoroughly opposed, having been a member of the court martial that dismissed him. Persons who have schemes before Congress for subsidies and kindred matters are struck dumb with amazement and admiration to hear that the Commerce Committee reports in favor of guaranteeing six per cent interest on \$50,000,000 bonds for the mythical ship-railway of Capt. Eads across the isthmus. Mr. Eads has always been remarkably successful in engineering his projects through Congress, and perhaps one reason for his success is that he never strikes for paltry hundreds of thousands, as do the more modest beleaguers of the Treasury, but boldly demands millions. But it is easier to get through a committee than through the whole Senate, and easier to carry a scheme through the latter body with its 76 members than through the House with its 293. So Eads is not out of the woods yet. If the house he will have hard work to conciliate Holman the objector. Holman is always in session when the House is, and Speaker Kieter has doubtless found out by this time that the rugged old Hoosier is, by the dispensation of nature a member of all committees, and by virtue of his own indefatigable industry personally in charge of all bills that have money in them. Holman doesn't sit in the committee rooms, but when any committee tries to bore a hole in the treasury they are sure to find Holman around when the boring begins, and just as well informed as any

member of the committee about the size of the proposed hole. Congress pegs along without raising much excitement. The old cry that "the Chinese must go" has taken fresh impetus, and judging by a vote of nearly two to one in the Senate, the influx of almond-eyed Celestials will be stopped if legislation can stop it. There is also a strong probability that we shall have some tariff legislation after all. Mr. Wm. E. Chandler expects to be made Secretary of the Navy very soon, though old Hunt, as the politicians call him, has seemed to be fixed to stay. His young wife, who is his third, is a good deal of a "society" woman, and has laid herself out to make things pleasant for the President—a widower in the prime of life, handsome, gallant, well fed, and fond of social life. This "society" business is a most powerful lever to work on a man who is in power and who is fond of it, and the impression exists here that the Hunts are working it for all it is worth. Secretary of State Frelinghuysen has three daughters who figure prominently in all of the lum-tum social gatherings.

A SUGGESTIVE fact in connection with the passage of the Chinese bill in the Senate is that out of the 28 Senators who rightly voted in favor of it, but 7 were Republicans; while out of the 15 Senators who wrongly voted against the passage of a bill that was demanded, 13 were Republicans. This is a bad showing, a shameful record for the Republican party in the United States Senate.
