CONTENTMENT.

Rev. Henry Ward Beecher on the Beautiful.

Man's love and admiration for the beautiful was of sure and natural growth. He began by sleeping on a pile of straw in a stable, and after a time he wanted a bedstead. Not that he slept any better on a bedstead than upon his pile of straw, but still there was a something in him that prompted him to want a bedstead. It was a sprouting of a love for the beautiful. He had been eating his bread and meat from a box, but now he wanted a table. His bread and meat did not taste any better from a table, but still he felt that he must have it. He used to come into the house with his hands black with dirt, but now he washed them and he felt better for it. He was on the threshold of the beautiful. By-and-by his wife put a clean white cloth on the table. He looked at it in wonder, but he liked it. His meal did not taste any better, but he enjoyed it. The next element was his love for his children. He did not want to see them dressed poorer than those of his neighbor. Then came chromos and pictures on the wall, and by-and-by a piano tinkled in the front room. The man was on the right track to appreciate the nobler elements of life. If a young man was willing to deny himself and work hard so that in the future he need not work, he could do so. But he could not spend the whole of his earnings on present pleasure and enjoy prosperity in the future. If a man wanted to be independent he must earn, and could do as thousands did: begin where their fathers left off. If he wanted prosperity before it was earned, he would be trapped in our own folly. If a man was willing to give his body and soul to work, at the age of 35 he ought to be able to stand independent of the world. As he acquired property he unfolded his faculties; and his love for the beautiful carried him further and further away from animalism. The use of luxury and the beautiful was but imperfectly understood. Self-denial, honesty, truth and earnestness were principles of prosperity, and luck damned a man. Men built upon substantial virtues or they built upon sand. He, the lecturer, advocated luxury, but at the same time did not recognize the right of man to make a beast of himself or prostitute his riches. The higher faculties should be fed and not the lower appetites. The farmer who was willing to give his family only the necessities of life and laugh at their desire for luxuries, foddered his family as he did his cattle. They needed food for the mind. There was hunger behind the eye—love, reason, aspirations, ambition, crying out for food. They wanted luxury, not for the passions and appetites, but for the higher faculties. Every man should supply himself with luxuries for the soul. Man might use riches for himself, for his household and for society. Every man who uses wealth for himself and for his family, did it for society. He had earned his right to pleasure and should have it. Pleasure was not contrary to virtue. The noblest sensations were the heroic ones, and whoever made manhood seem better than before was a public benefactor. There was an idea that man to be a Christian must not spend his money on himself, but there was nothing wrong in this. He might spend his money for jewelry and fine clothes, if it gave him pleasure, and was in good taste, for good taste was

morality. He had a right to spend money on himself if he did not cheat his family. Everything that was higher than the animal in man made him a broader and a nobler man. If the use of luxuries made him more manly and beautiful it was a good work. If a man could clothe his wife in silks and satins and velvets, he had a right to do so, and it certainly made her look more beautiful.

The lecturer then proceeded to sharply criticize low-necked dresses and long trains, but said that a man was a fool to preach against the fashions, for they would be followed anyway. He never attained sanctification, but he never trod upon a train that he did not say "Glory," and never heard the stitches crack without saying "Hallelujah."

There is a strong probability that the year 1882 will add 1,000,000 to our population by immigration alone.

An Indianapolis couple were married in 1872, divorced in 1877, remarried in 1879, and now sue to be divorced.

In 1880 France took from Italy 40,000,000 gallons of wine, being more than four-fifths of Italy's total wine export.

Seventy American women took

out patents last year, and the most valuable invention was a five-cent shoe buttoner.

Cincinnati consumes on the average per day 19,476,739 gallons of water, and has pumping power equal to 42,500,000 gallons.

The keeper of a Chicago gaming establishment, says that in 1881 there passed over the gaming tables of that city \$8,000,000.

The assessed valuation of property in Texas is now said to be \$363,000,000, an increase of \$10,000,000 since the assessment of 1880.

New York ladies are said to employ professional billiard players to come once a week and initiate them into the mysteries of the game.

The city of Boston contains 41,926 dwelling houses, valued at \$4,013,000. There are, besides, 73 hotels and 147 family hotels in the city.

The tax levy of Pittsburgh for 1882 amounts to \$1,121,976.57. Population 156,387. The city pays interest on a funded debt of \$14,125,296.

About one year ago a speculator bought the famous natural bridge in Virginia for \$18,000. He sold it to another party for \$20,000, and it has just been sold again for \$55,000.

In the last twenty years, twenty-nine murderers sent to the Connecticut state prison for life have been pardoned out after an average confinement of eight and one-half years.

General Sherman says that the army now numbers 23,785 enlisted men and 2,000 officers, 18,525 of whom are west of the Mississippi, leaving 5,256 to guard the eastern country.

The net profits of the Bank of England are \$135,000 a week, or about \$22,500 a day. Carrying the calculation a little further, the profits are \$3,750 an hour, taking the money day to consist of six hours.

Texas, with its more than 374,000 square miles, has 62,000 square miles more than the German Empire, 72,000 more than France, is twice the size of Great Britain and Ireland together, and almost as large as Sweden and Norway together.

The Gentiles in Utah, who number 32,000, against 113,000 Mormons, own nearly all the 800 miles of railroad in the territory; half of the taxable property belongs to them; they own much mining property, and have invested \$500,000 during the past ten years in schools, hospitals and similar institutions.

The average product of human industry is now set down at \$100 per head per annum. In Great Britain, for the year 1880, the average product was about \$290; for Europe it was \$115, and for the United States about \$200. Within the last decade there has been a rise of 12 per cent in the average industrial production.
