The Sam Mendel has cleared for Queenstown. She has 52,135 bushels wheat, worth \$51,624.

A brother of the millionaire Vanderbilt, shot and killed himself in New York last Monday.

706 Republican votes were cast at the Salem primary; 73 more than for Congressman George in 1880.

Official correspondence indicates that no lighthouse will be built at Shoalwater bay for some time to come.

Capt. Denny, of the Yaquina, was in yesterday; the cares of life and a pilot coat sit easily upon him.

The Olympians are going to hold a meeting at which they will decide just what wages to pay Chinamen that they employ.

The Dakota insane asylum at Yankton, burned last Monday night; four lives, and \$10,000 worth of property were lost.

Several cases of salmon have already been put up, and the steamer that leaves Portland this morning will take down from here the first shipment of salmon from the Columbia river this season.

Jesse James, the notorious train robber was killed near St. Joseph, Mo., last Monday. As this is the fourth report of the same tenor the verdict as to his killing might be in the fourth degree.

Gen. Hurlbut, American Minister to Peru, died at Lima on the 28th of March. 'Tis but a few weeks ago that Gen. Kilpatrick died at Santiago, Chile; something is the matter on the south Pacific coast.

The Yaquina arrived down at a late hour last Monday night and sails for Tillamook this morning; from there she goes to Yaquina, and to San Juan island for lime. She has forty-four passengers on board and a large consignment of freight.

Capt. Percival, a Cape Cod mariner of the old school, was once awakened in his bunk by a shipmate with the announcement that the vessel was going to eternity. "Well," replied the Captain, "I've got ten ferds over there to one in this world; let her go." And he turned over and went to sleep again.

Due notice has been given to city tax-payers to hand in their assessment returns to E. C. Holden, city assessor. The assessment book must be soon made up and those who do not hand in their blanks duly filled out within two or three days, may have the trouble of dancing attendance for two or three days on the Board of Equalization when they meet. A word to the wise ought to be sufficient.

Still Hangs Fire.

The Chinese bill still lies on the President's desk. 'Tis thought that he will either veto it with the suggestion that the term of limitation be reduced from twenty years to ten, or else let it become a law without his signature, after the lapse of the usual ten days; the first would be ignorant, and the second would be cowardly; but that depends a good deal on the locality. Probably if we lived in sentimental Massachusetts and believed that the Chinese were purposely kept in heathenism by the Almighty that we of this country might convert them, it would seem right; as it is, it looks as though President Arthur was trying to see how much the Republican party could stand without going to pieces. If he keeps on he may possibly be enlightened.

Since the above was in type, a dispatch last night says "President Arthur vetoed the Chinese bill today."
