The Veto.

The news that the President had vetoed the Chinese bill was received yesterday morning by our citizens with every expression of disgust it was not unexpected, but the fact that such action on the part of our Chief Executive had been accomplished was a matter of adverse comment. Politically, it gives Democratic stock a boom, that the managers of that party will not be slow to avail themselves of. A San Francisco dispatch says: "Mr. George, of Oregon, is about the most disgusted member with the veto, as the election in his state comes early, first among congressional elections, and the result in that state, it is feared, may be disastrous to him. Mr. Berry, of California, is the maddest man of the lot. He is talking in an excited way to correspondents and members, denouncing the veto as an outrage."

Democratic State Convention.

The Democratic State Convention met at the court house in Portland at eleven o'clock yesterday morning; a full delegation was present and after organization, the appointment of a committee on credentials and a committee on resolutions, the convention adjourned till this morning. We were promised a report of the proceedings, but at the time the telegraph office closed the convention had not proceeded to nominate. That part of the business will probably be completed to-day.

The Wanlock.

When the hatches of the Wanlock were opened yesterday noon a strong smell of gas showed that spontaneous combustion had set in and immediate steps were taken to have her unloaded. At seven o'clock the work of hoisting out the coke began, and when we were there last night it seemed as if there were no grounds for alarm as to the destruction of the cargo. No. 2's engine was got ready, and in case of emergency can be on the spot at once and flood the vessel.

First of the Season.

Upon our dock is a can of Columbia river salmon, differing but little from the remaining 599,999 cases that will be put up here this season, and yet deserving of special mention, as it is alleged to be the first can of salmon put up on the Columbia this season. 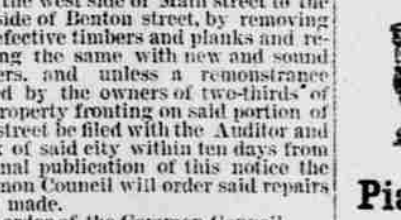

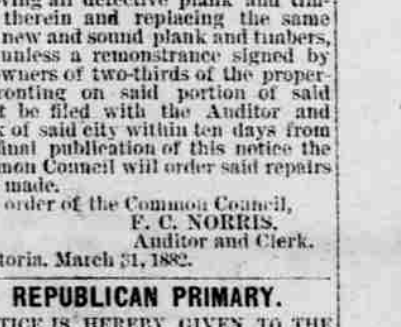
