—Republican County Convention to-day.

—The Dayton News, having been burned out, has suspended.

—On the Oregon Short line the rails are laid nearly to Snake river.

—“Are we going to have a railroad depot?” is the question in Portland.

—It is thought the river and harbor appropriation bills will aggregate \$15,000,000.

—Portland thinks of bringing water from above Vancouver, at an expense of \$513,000.

Four-fifths of the steers passengers that do not get off at Astoria, are actual settlers.

—The Crown Prince came down yesterday morning and cleared for sea in the afternoon.

—Salem is threatened with another journalistic abortion in the shape of an alleged “daily paper.”

—Out of eighty-nine newspapers that we have seen since Arthur’s veto, but one—the Pagot Sound Argus—favors it.

—The Yamhill Reporter states that men working for the O. P. R. R. Co. have to take their chances about getting their pay.

—Three Chinese miners were robbed and murdered near Lewiston, I. T., last week. A man named Gamoway has been arrested on suspicion.

—A letter from an American ship captain now at Hongkong states that there are 21 American ships in that port of which seven were coming to Portland with Chinamen and merchandise.

—R. B. Hayes is a Democratic candidate for the Legislature in Lane county. Hayes—Hayes,—it seems to us we have heard that name somewhere before.

—Three thousand arrests have been made in San Francisco for violation of the Sunday law, and the judges have ordered that no more arrests be made till they dispose of the business now on hand.

—The survey of the Wanlock took place day before yesterday. No great amount of material damage was discoverable, and the coal will be hoisted out to-day on Flavel’s dock, after which the tin plate will be swung out.

—The commerce of Yaquina bay has increased one hundred per cent in the last two weeks. Another “ship” has entered that lovely port, making two—one and one are two—that have succeeded. The local paper speaks of “a fleet.”

—The white-sailed boats that dotted the broad surface of the Columbia yesterday afternoon gleamed brightly in the brilliant sunlight and formed a pleasing bit of landscape and water escape for any one who had time to look at it.

**Catching Clams at Tillamook**

Talking about a summer’s sojourn in the vicinity of Astoria, and of the dolce far niente to be enjoyed in the summer time on our bracing coast, a writer in the West Shore says: “A good day’s sport can be had during the summer by engaging an Indian with his canoe for the purpose of seal shooting. When the salmon begin running, seals follow them in over the bar into the bay, and for a good mile shot who can hit a seal head at fifty yards, when they come up for air and reconnoitering purposes, it is no difficult thing to kill enough of the bright-eyed bullet-headed fellows in a day, to supply the entire country with oil for the winter. One of my principal amusements at this place was to kill my pockets with cartridges, and after securing good cover on the ridge, sit-gun in hand, there, to kill time, if nothing else, blaze away at the flocks of “shags” as they flew over from the ocean to their breeding grounds on the bay. It was in this way that we obtained our bait for crabbing—and crabbing as we carried it on, was perhaps never surpassed in the world for actual results. We got a carriage wheel tire and knif a net to fit it; then skinned our birds, tied them out to the bottom of the net, and sailed out into the stream, where we anchored and three overboard our crab trap. People who have gone crabbing in Jersey, or even those who have seen the Chinese catch them with nota knit around small barrel hoops, on Meigs’ wharf in San Francisco, can form no idea of the success of our scheme. We allowed our net to remain on the bottom just eight minutes to pull up it took three men to lift it and its contents into the boat. There were crabs of all stages and conditions of crustacean life. Little ones, middle-sized, and actual giants; some of which latter were covered with barnacles, veterans, stars, perhaps, as many had lost one or more legs in some life and death contest for supremacy, years before—all snapping, crawling, squirming and chewing at one another’s limbs in one great tangled mass. Two castings of this net—and after throwing overboard all the small ones—yielded fully one hundred big red-backed crabs, with legs on them as large as turkeys’ thighs. Should a man want to go into the business of catching crabs, he could find a splendid field for operations in Tillamook bay. The big net in our parlor was utilized to boil them in, and notwithstanding we gave quantities away, we had crabs plain, crab salad, and deviled crabs until we all grew “sick and tired” of it. Porgie, smelt, tom-cod, flounder and rock-cod fishing in the bay is excellent, and but little time need be spent in catching a big string. Every afternoon a gentle breeze springs up, and if nothing more inviting is “on the carpet,” a pleasant boat-sail will be had to the different points of interest on the bay, to such classic spots as Ox-bow Bend and Jawbone. Yet in store for the visitor is a night with the salmon fishermen, a visit to the oyster beds, and a berrying campaign along the creeks.

Tillamook is Barneatz, and plenty more besides. It not only has all the attractions incident to salt water, but has trout streams right at hand, and mountain pleasures running up from the very bench. There is no place on the Atlantic coast like this. You stand among trout streams and oyster beds, deer runs and surf-bathing, grouse shooting and clam bottoms. At Tillamook the mountain and the beach have wedded—the salt sea and the crystal brook have kissed and become as one.
