**CLATSOP COUNTY REPUBLICAN CONVENTION**

**A Full Ticket Placed in Nomination-Resolutions, Etc.**  
 The Republican county convention for Clatsop county met at the Court House at two o'clock yesterday afternoon. I. W. Case, the temporary chairman, called the convention to order. J. H. D. Gray was elected permanent chairman, and W. E. Dement secretary; three gentlemen were appointed committee on credentials, and some pertinent remarks were made in reference to some recognition of local demands in the resolutions to be adopted. A committee on resolutions was appointed, which reported the following:  
**Resolved,** By the Republicans of Clatsop county, in county convention assembled. That we learn with profound regret of the veto of the anti-Chinese bill by Chester A. Arthur, the acting President of the United States, so much in opposition to the well-known views of the Republican administration of the late lamented President Garfield.  
**Resolved,** That the Republican party has ever shown itself to be the friend and protector of the industrial interests of the nation, and the trusty advocate of the working class. And,  
**Resolved,** That the said veto meets with our unqualified disapproval, being in direct opposition to the policy of the Republican party on this coast, and we denounce it as unwise, and condemn the policy which prompted it. And,  
**Resolved,** That we hereby express our most sincere commendation to all the representatives from the Pacific coast, and especially to our energetic representative, Hon. M. C. George, for their untiring advocacy of the anti-Chinese bill.  
 The following was also unanimously adopted:  
**WHEREAS,** Congress in the year 1870 granted to the Oregon Central Railroad company each alternate section of the unoccupied lands between Astoria and the Willamette valley for the purpose of building a railroad from Forest Grove to the mouth of the Columbia river, and  
**WHEREAS,** Said alternate sections of land have been withdrawn from the public lands. And  
**WHEREAS,** No portion of the road between Forest Grove and Astoria has been built and the time for completing said road expired six years ago. And  
**WHEREAS,** The settlement of said portion of the country is delayed, and the material interests of the lower Columbia as well as the whole Willamette valley and State of Oregon are thereby injured. Therefore  
**Resolved,** That said grant should be immediately declared forfeited and returned to the public domain, and that we demand of our representatives in Congress their ceaseless and untiring effort to that effect.  
 Nominations being in order, Dr. I. S. Kinsey received the unanimous vote of the convention for coroner; Gelo F. Parker received the unanimous vote of the convention for county surveyor. Henry Fisher and D. W. Pease were nominated for county commissioners. W. W. Parker received the unanimous vote of the convention for assessor; J. W. Welch received the unanimous vote of the convention for sheriff; C. A. McGuire received the nomination for county judge; A. F. Johns was nominated for county treasurer. H. Sloop received the nomination for superintendent of public instructions; Col. R. R. Spedden received the nomination for county clerk; F. C. Reed was nominated for joint state senator for Clatsop, Columbia and Tillamook counties.  
 The matter of state delegates next received the attention of the convention, resulting in the election of the following four gentlemen as delegates to the Republican State Convention, to be held at Portland, next Thursday, F. C. Ward, C. W. Fulton, F. J. Taylor, J. H. D. Gray. It was also carried that a certificate of election be issued to J. Q. A. Borlby, being in the discretion of the state convention to admit. Next in order was the appointing of a county central committee, chairman, J. H. D. Gray. The convention then adjourned sine die.

 The New England supper at Liberty Hall, last Tuesday evening was a success socially and financially, everyone present having had "a first-rate time," and the receipts aggregating \$100. The ladies in attendance were dressed after the style of "our Grand-mothers' days," and received many compliments upon their appearance.
