The Columbia is due from San Francisco this morning with 153 cabin passengers and a large crowd in the steerage.

"Uncle Tom's Cabin," we are informed will be produced by Rail's company on the 2d and 3d of next June at Liberty hall.

Held without Bail.

Immediately after the death of Alexander Lowrie Alexander, at the hospital last Sunday morning, Coroner Franklin was notified and he impaneled a jury, who gave the following verdict:

STATE OF OREGON, County of Clatsop.

In the matter of the inquisition upon the body of Alexander Lowrie Alexander, deceased, we, the undersigned jurors, summoned to appear before R. B. Franklin, coroner of the precinct of Astoria, county of Clatsop and state of Oregon, at St. Mary's hospital, in the city of Astoria, county and state aforesaid, on the 23d day of April, 1882, to inquire into the cause of the death of said Alexander Lowrie Alexander, having been duly sworn according to law, and having made such inquisition after inspecting the body and hearing the testimony adduced, upon our oaths, each and all do say that we find the deceased was named Alexander Lowrie Alexander, a native of Scotland, aged about 35 years; that he came to his death from the effects of an ax wound in the right side of the abdomen, from the hands of John Bain, on the 12th day of April, 1882, at the shop of C. H. Bain, in the city of Astoria, county and state aforesaid.

The above was certified to by Coroner Franklin, and filed April 24th. A warrant was issued and subpoenas issued and the examination took place Monday afternoon before Judge Fox, at the court-house. The following witnesses were examined: Dr. A. C. Kinney, Dr. Jay Tuttle, E. J. Hart, Charles Stopperson and Fred Anderson. Upon hearing the testimony Judge Fox decided that the accused be held without bail to await the action of the next grand jury. The prisoner was accordingly remanded to the custody of the sheriff.

SCHOOL MEETING.

Considerable Business Transacted.

A special school meeting of the voters of School District No. 1 was held at the school house on Main street last Monday evening. There was not a very large crowd present, but what was lacking in numbers was made up in unanimity of purpose. The meeting was called to order by the chairman, J. W. Gearhart, and the purposes for which the meeting was called were stated. It was moved and seconded that a tax of 4 mills be levied for the purpose of raising funds for the ensuing year. Carried. It was moved and seconded that the plans submitted by the Board of Directors be accepted, and that the building be contracted for. This was also voted unanimously in the affirmative. It was decided by vote that the building be finished in ash, with basement of stone, etc., the estimated cost of the completed building to be \$10,571. The motion that a tax of 5 mills be levied for building purposes prevailed, it being thought best to levy the tax in this way to enable the Directors to go on with the work at once. The Directors were also empowered to sell the Main street school property at public auction and negotiate a loan to furnish and finish the new school house; to proceed with the building and, if possible, have it completed by September 1, 1882, or not later than October 1, 1882. Upon motion the meeting adjourned.

Fish Story.

The report comes from all sides that the run of smelt in the Columbia river near the Lower Cascades and in the Sandy has been unprecedented in the history of the country. At the Sandy, which is a small stream emptying into the Columbia, the fish have crowded into the river so thick that the farmers for miles around are busily engaged in shoveling them out with pitchforks or pronged sticks and picking them. A prominent artist went trout-fishing over there and came back astonished. He said he could not find bottom, the fish were so thick. A gentleman down from the Cascades states that the banks are lined with dead fish. The smelt yearly come in from the sea in great shoals to spawn in the river. They swarm up to the Cascades, where they can go no further, and literally crowd each other out of the water. 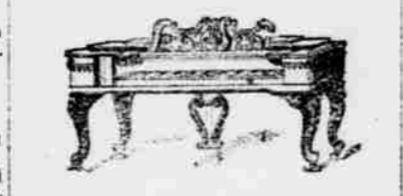
