The Electoral Count Bill.

The passage by the senate, without a call for the yeas and nays, of the bill to regulate the count of electoral votes, shows that senators, while unable to agree upon the principle or phraseology of a bill, believed that the one before them changes existing laws for the better, in which opinion it is probable there will be a general conference.

The time for the meeting of the electors is postponed from the first Wednesday in December to the second Monday in January, so that more than two months will intervene between the election by the people of Presidential electors and the official meeting of the latter to choose a President and Vice-President. The bill provides that the title of any electors may be inquired into and settled by the state in which the contest arises prior to their official meeting in accordance with the law of force upon the day of their appointment, and that the decision of such state shall be binding upon congress when that body makes the count. This provision met with objection on the part of some Republican senators, who contended that congress, and not the states, had a right to determine who had been chosen electors. If the bill becomes a law each state should see to it that statutes be framed between now and the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1884, under which electoral contests, if any arise can be decided without delay, so that but one lawful return of votes will be sent to the President of the Senate. This is the main point in the bill itself in which it differs from all previous legislation. It provides also for a case where a question arises as to the lawfulness of either of two or more state tribunals which exercise authority in the matter, the one being recognized, which Congress, each house acting separately, shall determine to be the legal one, and a decision in the same manner is necessary if there be an undetermined contest between two or more sets of electors. If there be only one return from a state it must be counted unless both Houses, voting separately, otherwise determine. After the fifth calendar day next after the meeting of the two Houses there shall be no recess until the count is completed.
