NOTES FROM THE CHEHALIS

A New Country.

MONTESANO, May 24, 1882.

EDITOR ASTORIAN:

Dear Sir: A few items from the Chehalis valley concerning its prospects and people may not prove uninteresting to a portion of the readers of THE ASTORIAN, of which the most stirring, if not the latest, is that of the earthquake which occurred here on Sunday evening last at 11 o'clock p. m. It was preceded and accompanied with a heavy rumbling sound which lasted for several seconds. Its motion was at first gentle but became severe enough toward the last to have shaken down brick buildings of which, very fortunately, we have none in this section of country. We are indeed thankful that so little damage has resulted from it. Some people were badly frightened, which feeling also extended to domestic animals such as cows and sheep, the lowings of the one and bleatings of the other after the shock, denoting their evident terror and alarm. The new steambark Montesano, commanded by Capt. Whitcomb and owned by the S. W. B. T. Co., and intended to run on the waters of Chehalis river and Grays Harbor arrived here on the 27th, making the trip from Astoria to this place in about ten hours, the distance being about 90 miles. The people here hailed her coming with delight as they have long felt their great need of such a craft on these waters. She is evidently the best for this trade possessing as she does several points of excellence, being very staunch, capacious, seaworthy, and having great power and speed, as many of the people reading here can testify to being carried by her on a May day excursion down the river and over the waters of the harbor, stopping at various way points and returning again in the evening of the same day. The president of the company, Mr. Lewman, accompanied the excursion, who, with the officers of the boat, tried to make the occasion an enjoyable one for all, which they did succeed in doing. Among the items of interest noted on the trip was that of the improvements already made and being carried on at Hopkinn, the mill site selected by the well known lumber firm of Simpson & Co. for their new steam saw mill which is in course of construction, the pile driver being busily engaged in driving piles for the foundation. A fine wharf and warehouse are already built and the machinery on the ground for the mill, which is expected to be finished some time in June and will have a cutting capacity of about 50,000 feet per day. There is ample room for several first-class saw mills on Gray's Harbor, as it is, in addition to its being a natural depot to receive the supply of timber which can be brought down the many streams which enter into it, an excellent shipping point, being safe and easy of access, having seventeen or eighteen feet of water on its bar at extreme low tide and a straight well defined channel.

There is an abundance of good timber on the Chehalis and all its tributaries as well as on the various streams entering into the harbor. It would not be exaggerating to say that there is as much good timber in this county which is accessible, as in any county in the territory. Emigration is slowly finding its way here, yet we are hopeful that settlers will find their way here soon in large numbers to occupy the extensive tracts of vacant land in this valley, which are rich and productive. The population of our county is but one thousand while there is room and good homes for several thousands. Montesano, the county seat, is situated about the head of tide water on the Chehalis river and has 3 stores, 2 hotels, 1 blacksmith shop and 1 flour and feed warehouse, also a well finished and commodious church and a good school house. The people of this county are, as a class, moral, temperate, intelligent and industrious. There has not been a criminal case on the court docket for this county for several years, which is no doubt owing to the absence of saloons and places where intoxicants are sold. The people are determined that whisky shall be kept out in the future. After July 1st we will have a semi-weekly mail instead of a weekly mail as at present from Olympia to Astoria and return passing through the valley, which will be to us a great boon indeed. It is the intention of the government to have it carried by steamer over as much of the route as possible between the two places. For this purpose there is in addition to the steamer plying between Astoria and Bakers bay a fine steambark on Shoalwater bay and also the Montesano on Chehalis river and Gray's Harbor thus rendering it both safe and pleasant as well for travel. Mr. Peterson has had a town site laid off at Chehalis point which will be a rival to Hoquiam, and he believes the Long Branch of the Pacific. We learn that several Portland families have already secured lots and intend spending all or a part of the summer there.

We are hopeful and happy as a people believing that our county is just entering upon a new era of prosperity and greatness. M. Cause for Congratulation. It is always with feelings of delight that our Astoria merchants learn that one of the San Francisco steamers has made a "quick trip." The annoyance consequent upon having the Astoria freight carried up the Columbia and a part of the way into the prominent valley of the Willamette and then back again, is of minor importance. True, it would look more like business to discharge freight at the point to which sellers consign it, but the trip from terminus to terminus would be lengthened several hours, and that would never do. Sometimes a portion of the mail goes up also; indeed the passengers destined for this place should be grateful that sufficient time is given them to get off, for should the steamer go by without stopping at all, there would be a whole hour and a half more to lie at the dock at Portland, which appears to be the desideratum.

Oregon Beach Lands

There are thousands of acres of sand beach in Oregon, which in time can be reclaimed and made available for pasture purposes. To do so will require money to be expended and labor to be performed. It requires seven or eight years to reclaim these lands, and that is probably the reason that no one has undertaken it. The system of reclamation is to sow yellow lupine, which in a few years produces a fair and durable sod. In the meantime the shrub alfalfa good for browsing for cattle. The lupine should be sown first with barley, during the rainy season; the barley comes up first, and checks the drift of the sand by its rank and heavy stalks. Lupine grows slowly at first, taking very deep root; the second year after it is sown it is hardy enough to take care of itself, and begins to spread rapidly, and soon weaves an almost impenetrable network over the sands, and creates a rich mold by the decay of its leaves. On the coasts of France miles upon miles of land so reclaimed are now bearing crops of vegetables and cereals. This system has become very popular on the sand hills about the harbor of San Francisco, and many beautiful gardens have taken the place of barren dunes. Take this coast and institute a similar procedure, and a few years to come would find good farms along the now desolate beach. -West Shore.

Diaphanous

The editor of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer says that, while he was recently at Kalama, an Astorian, who claimed to have been in the country between thirty and forty years, informed him that early in the fifties it was common enough at Portland to see a hundred salmon leap simultaneously from the water, and that along in 1848, '49 and '50 he had seen the river so full of salmon as to actually impede navigation, and that moments the air would be so full of leaping fish as to hide the water from view. The idea of an Astorian saying anything of the kind! It won't do.
