 —Yesterday was a dull misty day in Astoria with a correspondingly depressing influence on trade. The regular Saturday afternoon parade was unavoidably postponed.  
 —George Lowman, of boat No. 15, Jas. Williams Tanypt Cannery, caught a salmon yesterday weighing 75 pounds. It was fifty inches in length and measured thirty-six inches in circumference.  
 —A polyglot periodical has been started in Vienna, the articles in which are to be written in twelve different languages. That would be a capital idea for the political papers in this country.  
 —The driver for the foundation of the new building, corner Cass and Squemoqua streets, is about rigged, and as soon as the piles can be got on the ground, which will be this week, the work will begin.  
 —On the last trip of the Yaguna, Capt. Denny made the passage in twenty-five hours. He brought up 269 tons of Coos bay coal from the Newport mine, 150 of which was discharged here yesterday.

A year ago the United States fish commissioner had a car constructed for carrying fish spaw and fry, and obtained concessions on the Atlantic slope roads for its transportation at 20 cents per mile. It was held that the propagation of food fishes in time fully repay these concessions. Would it not be an excellent idea for our canneries to confer with Mr. Villard about just such a car to transport salmon spaw from the lower Columbia to its head tributaries, and hatching establishments be inaugurated there in harmony with the natural propagating salmon interest, instead of turning the fry out from the Cleckmans into the Willamette, to at once encounter the contact of the upriver woolen mills' liquid effluvia and our city sewage, with a certainty of failure to reach the sea and mature?

**A Marine Bicycle.**

Something new has been attracting considerable attention in the shape of a marine bicycle. It consists of two narrow boats, each twenty feet long, connected by iron braces. It has an elevated seat in the center with pedals, as in a road machine. These pedals convey the motion to a propeller at the stern as the rider treads upon them. The rudder is controlled by a handle of the usual pattern. The marine bicycle moves easily and smoothly over the water, and it is almost impossible to upset it on account of its catamaran shape. In the hands of an expert rider a speed of eight miles an hour has been made upon it.
