Judge Elliott arrived home from a lengthened visit to southern California, on the Columbia.

John Walker, who has been sitting with consumption for some time, died at Ilwaco yesterday morning.

Hon. George H. Williams is expected to arrive in Oregon about the middle of the month, from Washington.

Thirty-nine ships cleared from the San Francisco Custom House, during the month of April, loaded with wheat.

Denis Kearney has again reached the topmost pinnacle of human ambition. He is reported for a daily morning paper.

"Courtesy opens many doors," says an old adage. It also opens the door behind it, and there is where it differs from the exchange fund.

And now it is claimed that Jesse James was not killed. If so there's considerable sympathy going to waste in the sovereign state of Missouri.

Dean Blanchard is driving 600 piles next to the West Coast cannery. The ground will be used for net racks this year, and next season the Columbia Cannery Company will move on to it from Fisherton.

The Matiner's Home was formally opened in Portland last Tuesday evening. It is a most worthy institution for the benefit and protection of sailors, and might worthily find fitting copy in another of the same kind in this place.

The delegates to the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F., which meets at Salem next Tuesday, are A. J. Megler, J. Q. A. Bowley, George McLean and S. C. Benner. The Astoria representatives to the grand encampment are I. W. Cass, E. C. Holden and G. Reed.

Scoville is now trying to get a stay of proceedings or a reprieve in the Guiteau case by alleging that his wife, Guiteau's sister, is insane, and that insanity runs in the Guiteau family. Doubtless it does; but it is that kind that should be rendered extinct.

The body of an unknown man was found floating in the water at Bergman & Berry's slaughter house yesterday afternoon. A coroner's inquest was held, the verdict being that he came to his death by drowning. He was about 35 years of age, light mustache, heavy set, five feet five inches in height.

Several suspected persons have been arrested for alleged complicity in the murder of Cavendish, the Irish secretary. The London Times insists that the murder was the act of the Land League; the other English papers are inclined to the opinion that it was an enemy of Gladstone's policy.

Columbia river salmon—the best quality on the coast, never reaches this market. Most of the catch is shipped to Europe. The inferior grades are sold in the United States.

We clip the above from a Kansas exchange. It sufficiently exemplifies the world wide market afforded to our staple product. The West and South are almost wholly unsupplied.

Dr. Lewis Swift writes to the Rochester (N. Y.) Express that the Wells comet will at its perihelion be visible in "full sunshine." He adds: "A few previous comets have been visible by daylight, but such comets are very rare." The comet will probably not be visible to the naked eye much before the 29th of May. It will be in the morning sky when brightest, a very discouraging announcement to lazy people.

Lawless Lawrence

Everyone remembers the sensation occasioned by the marriage at the Occidental hotel in this city, one evening last January, of "Thomas F. Squires" and Miss Nellie Sloan, of Portland, at the subsequent announcement of the fact that the couple were runaways, the man being a well-known Portland clerk named Lawrence, and married there, where he and his wife were universally respected. From Astoria they went to San Francisco, and across the continent, finally taking flight over the sea to Bern, Switzerland, where rumors seized Lawrence, and, sending his fair partner to her uncle in Bloomington, Illinois, he telegraphed to his heart-broken wife in Portland for "forgiveness." She, through her friends, answered his repeated appeals by saying she would have nothing more to do with him, and the matter remained in this state till the arrival of the Columbia at Portland last Tuesday morning, when Squires, alias Livingstone, alias Lawrence, stepped ashore and sought his wife. He was arrested, and in default of \$10000 bail, was committed and lodged in jail. To the question whether he was not insane when he ran away and insane in coming back, he said it was "a blind infatuation" that he didn't foresee the terrible consequences until after he had left Astoria, and if there had been any chance to undo his acts he would have done so. He said that his intention in coming back was to get a divorce from his wife and then join "Nellie" in Bloomington. The charge against him is bigamy, and it is thought that he will be indicted in a few days and tried at this term of court.

The taking of testimony in the suit of Mrs. J. A. Lawrence, for divorce, was completed before the referee, Seneca Smith, on Tuesday, and the findings, it is understood, when submitted, will warrant Judge Scott in issuing a decree of divorce. It is thought that it was the intention of Lawrence to get to Portland in time to prevent, if possible, his wife from carrying out her intention of procuring a divorce. Had he been let alone he might probably have succeeded, but his prompt arrival will probably put an stop to further efforts in that direction. Mr. Johnson, clerk of the Occidental, went up to Portland on the same boat with Lawrence and was the chief witness in the divorce case. He returned on the Bonita yesterday afternoon. He says Lawrence looks "thinner and sadder" than when here, but talks rationally enough and denies any imputation of insanity.

New Buildings.

Astoria has quite a building boom this season, but nothing compared with that the requirements are for new-comers. The class of buildings most particularly needed for are small dwelling houses or cottages, which would rent for \$10 or \$15 a month. In every part of the town new houses are going up. Following is a list of some of the larger buildings now in process of construction or to be put up this season, with name of builder: Value. Odd Fellows' association, brick building, \$25,000. Pacific Central Packing Company's cannery, 10,000. Hiram Brown, warehouse, 7,000. George Flavel, " 5,000. Presbyterian church, 4,000. Bromson hotel, 8,000. The smaller buildings, to the number of twenty, will cost from \$1000 to \$3000, each and give evidence of the state that astutes those who recognize the growing importance of our city.

Council Proceedings

The city council met last Tuesday evening, Mayor Hahn in the chair, a full board present. The usual officers were in attendance and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. A petition from J. W. Gearhart, on behalf of the board of school directors, asking to have the crossing of Main and Court, and Court and Benton streets improved, was referred to committee on streets and public ways. The report of the street superintendent was referred to the same committee. The city sexton's report was referred to committee on public property. Several ordinances relating to the repairs of sundry streets and sidewalks were passed. The claims of A. Ginder for \$1.70, Thomas Fairbro for \$1.70, and Thomas Logan for \$75, were ordered paid. The rest of the batch was referred, and the council adjourned.
