THERE'S MILLIONS IN IT.

The Golden Sands of Gray's Harbor.

For many years the great stretch of ocean beach from Cape Hancock to Cape Flattery has attracted the attention of gold seekers who noticing the black sand strewn along the coast conceived the idea of working it as it was worked at Gold Bluff, Port Orford, and other points to the south. But though the fact of gold being in the sand was easily demonstrated yet how to get it out at a fair profit has always been the problem. At times sporadic efforts have been made but with such poor success as to deter others from any continued attempt to develop the wondrous deposits of wealth along our western shore. About three years ago, in experimenting with some sand similar in character to this, which was sent from Nevada county, California, Thos. Edison, the great electrician, of Menlo Park, New Jersey, conceived the idea of using magnetism as a separating force, and the result was so satisfactory that a new impetus was given this matter of beach gold sand in California. About the same time Mr. P. D. Moore, of Olympia, who had been long cognizant of the immense deposits of this sand on the Washington territory coast, thought out a process which needed but a perfecting of the organization to insure its success. As soon as practicable he went on to Menlo park and for the last eighteen months has been experimenting and assaying, trying, and testing, until he now thinks he has solved the problem and secured a process by which this sand can be profitably worked. He succeeded in getting Edison interested in it, and upon his return from Menlo Park, about a month ago, where he made satisfactory arrangements, he organized the "Janet Gold Mining Company," of which he is president.

The scene of his operations is on the south side of Gray's Harbor, where a great spit of black auriferous sand puts out into the bay about a mile and a half from the weather beach. Here is an accumulated deposit, evidently washed up by the ocean from the attraction of submarine ledges, and, at a low estimate, aggregating 400,000 tons. Mr. Moore is now awaiting the arrival of machinery from the East, which will be taken to the point and placed in operation as soon as suitable buildings can be put up. The process is a most intricate one, and we are not sufficiently well versed in chemical nomenclature to explain the transmutations that will change the great heaps of black sand into bright \$20 pieces. But Mr. Moore is sanguine of success, and says, as soon as he gets his works in operation, he will be able to handle 200 tons per day, at an average cost of twenty-five cents per ton. As the sand assays from \$14 to \$20 per ton, it will be readily seen that here is "a right smart chance" of making a stake. With the machinery to arrive by the Oregon is a twenty-five-horsepower engine and boiler. The company will be able to begin operations next month, and then by the 1st of July they can produce a regular output of a million. Several members of the company are in town, having arrived on the last steamer, and all are confident of success. We shall be glad if their expectations are realized in this developing another of the many natural resources of our northwest coast.

Dedicatory Ceremonies

At 6 p. m. yesterday evening a fisherman by the name of Anderson, fell overboard out of his boat, about 300 yards from the ship Mt. Washington; John Nelson, together with Mr. F. E. Fitch, chief officer, and James Stevens the Watchman, jumped into the boat and endeavored to save the man, but he sunk about 5 seconds before they could reach him. They picked up the unfortunate man's hat. He was in the water about ten minutes. Two attempts were made to get hold of him but without avail.

For the benefit of our Pacific county subscribers we reproduce the following from the German edition of the West Shore for May.

Oysterville ist der Hauptplatz des Districts, welcher im nordwestlichen Theil von Washington liegt.

Dieser District ist schon sehr frucht organisirt worden, sein Wachstum, wegen Mangel an Verkehrswegen, ging jedoch sehr langsam von Statten.

Nach der letzten Volkszählung hat der District 1640 Einwohner, in welcher Zahl 400 Fischer und Chinesen, die in den Fischereien am Columbia arbeiten, inbegriffen sind. Diese Arbeiter halten sich namentlich nur zeitweilig in dem District auf. Ansonsten leben noch 300 Indianer in dem Bezirk. Der Werth des steuerbaren Eigentums betragt \$317,825, der wirkliche Werth davon ist jedoch wahrscheinlich höher. Von dieser Summe vertheilt sich ein grosser Theil auf zwei Sargmühllein, eine in Knappa am Columbia und eine in North Bond am Willapa Fluss, sowie drei Fischereien am Columbia; der Rest der Abschätzung ist auf Land. Der Bezirk grenzt im Norden an den Columbia, im Westen an das Stille Meer und gebort die ganze Shoalwater-Bai an ihm. Mit Ausnahme des Verkaufes von Aasem, ist jeder andere Geschlechtszweig ein rentabler. Der Preis des cultivirten Landes ist im Steigen begriffen, und will, nachdem bessere Verkehrswege gebaut sind, rapid in die Höhe gehen. Die Aukunft umfasst nur Bauholz und Fische, nicht etwa, weil keine Ackerbauprodukte gezogen werden können, sondern weil man hier dieselben keinen Absatz hat. Der Bezirk ist in einundzwanzig Schuldistricte eingetheilt, und wird in jedem District während 3 Monaten im Jahr Unterricht ertheilt in einigen dichter bevölkerten Ansiedelungen 6 Monate.
