There has never been a more unanimous raid, so to speak, in the direction of appropriations for publie buildings than is being made this session. Bills for the crection of eight of these structures were of eight of these structures were the session. Bills for the crection of eight of these structures were skipsnon. Skipsnon, May 16, 1882. passed under a suspension of the rules on Monday last. The amount appropriated by these bills is about a million and a half, representing, according to the scale usually applicable to such cases, an ultimate expenditure of some six millions of dollars. And these are but eight out of the hundred and twenty or thereabouts which await recognition. One or two feeble protests were made against the summary method in which these bills are put through, but as nearly every member of the House has, or expects to have, a bill for a public building in his pocket, the desire to oblige those who are fortunate enough to be recognized by the Speaker rose superior to all considerations of party or of publie duty.
