

Annual Meeting. (Continued from first page.) papers, relating to railroad matters and eastern Washington Territory. He traveled and wrote almost constantly during the last few years of his life, and nearly every paper in Oregon and Washington Territory has been favored with some of his communications, which usually related to the resources of the North west coast, of which he had a very high opinion, and were always well written and interesting. He had a great fund of information, a large amount of common sense, and a wonderful memory for a man of his age. He was well informed on all subjects, and has done more by his writings to make known the resources and advantages of Oregon and Washington Territory than any other man. David Newcomb was a noble and true man and a most excellent citizen. His death is a public loss to Oregon and Washington Territory. He was a devoted Methodist and a sincere advocate of temperance, and frequently delivered temperance lectures. He leaves a family of children and grandchildren and a wide circle of devoted friends to cherish his memory."

Although it is more than probable that other names and obituary notices should be entered upon our record, yet your Corresponding Secretary has not received any notice of such except through the public papers, in which we find the names of the Hon. Joseph Lane, an honorary member of this society, of Roseburg; General Joel Palmer, of Yamhill; Hon. T. R. Coffin, of Portland; S. E. Barr, of Gray's river, Pacific county, W. T. Our estimates of deaths of the pioneers of Oregon is 21 for the years 1881-2. Twelve names were added to our record by request and letter. Our library has increased 110 volumes, not yet entered upon its shelves for want of shelving and proper care. W. H. GRAY, Corresponding Secretary.

To the President and Members of the Pioneer and Historical Society of Oregon:

HONORED SIR AND MEMBERS:— Your corresponding secretary and chairman of a committee of five of the members of this society having by its appointment and resolution undertaken to procure the means to erect a suitable monument to the memory of the late Dr. Marcus Whitman and his associate dead, respectfully ask to present for your consideration the accompanying facts:

1st. By reference to the record, the committee consisting of W. H. Gray, T. P. Powers, John Hobson, W. D. Hare and A. Van Dusen, were appointed February 21st, 1874, eight years ago February 22, 1882. They were instructed to prepare an address to the people and present it to the society on the 8th of April, 1874. On the 13th of March, the committee met and discussed the subject of the address and adjourned to the 8th of April, and after mature deliberation agreed to report the address and form of subscription and recommend its adoption. On the 30th of May, a fourth meeting of the committee was held and arrangements made for distributing the circular letter and the subscription for funds—directing that they should be sent to the Grange organizations and to postmasters, and that the Treasurer should furnish copies of such address, circulars and blank envelopes. On the 29th of July, 1874, the first funds were received from Hon. Phil. Metscham and W. D. Rinehart—\$18. from the former and \$14. from the latter, making a total of \$32. from Grant county, with a list of donors' names. At the same meeting, Hon. T. P. Powers was unanimously appointed to canvass for funds, and the Treasurer instructed to furnish blank receipts for funds, and 300 circular letters. The corresponding secretary was instructed to notify Hon. C. Moore, of Walla Walla, that the committee had appointed and requested him to act as their agent and procure funds for the Whitman Monument. Mr. Moore was duly notified but declined.

The subject of the cost of the monument came before this meeting, and it was resolved that the amount should be \$10,000 for that purpose or more if practicable. On the 4th July, 1876, the committee met and requested and appointed Hon. W. D. Hare, he having proposed a visit to Walla Walla, to procure a deed to the

Pioneer and Historical Society of Oregon for at least one acre of land in the immediate vicinity of the place where the bones of the martyred Marcus Whitman and his associates were originally deposited, for the purpose of improving and grading and erecting thereon a suitable monument to the memory of the lamented dead. Hon. Mr. Hare did not make the proposed trip. A meeting of the committee was called on the 27th of November, 1877, adjourned till 28th, met and resolved that the corresponding secretary be and is hereby requested on behalf of the Pioneer and Historical Society of Oregon, to write a letter to Mr. Moore of Walla Walla and ascertain from him upon what terms this society can procure about one acre of ground, that the society may inclose the graves of Dr. Whitman and associates with the right way thereto from some public road. The ground to be deeded to the society and their successors, to be used only for the purpose of erecting thereon a monument to commemorate the memory of Dr. Whitman and associates.

The above is from the record of the monument committee showing briefly the perplexing delays that for some unexplained cause has prevented the work being accomplished as was contemplated by the society and the committee up to the last date and the record of its last meeting.
