The State of California is due from San Francisco this morning she has 457 passengers on board.

The American ship Ivy has finally succeeded in getting a crew and cleared yesterday. She has 64,176 bushels of wheat aboard, which is worth \$62,500.

At a meeting of the A. O. U. W. last Friday evening, Jas. W. Welch was appointed a delegate to the next meeting of the Grand Lodge at Olympia.

Miss Nora Wilson, one of our well known pianists, leaves to-day by the Oregon, for San Francisco. We understand she goes to continue her musical studies.

Messrs. J. O. Bozorth, and T. B. Bridwell announce themselves as candidates for Justice of the Peace and Constable, respectively, at the coming election.

The Gospel meeting at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, this afternoon at a quarter to three o'clock, will be held by Dr. J. W. Watts, of Oregon city. Cordial invitation extended to all.

The celebrated pre-arranged, Prof. Willis, will give an entertainment at Liberty Hall to-morrow evening. At the close of the performance 104 presents will be distributed among the audience.

Dr. J. W. Watts will preach in the Congregational church this evening at 7:30. Text: 1 Cor. x. 20. There will be no evening services in the Presbyterian and M. E. churches, that all may hear Dr. Watts.

The passenger lines running from here to Cippertown are accommodating and are deservedly enjoying a good run of custom. They stop anywhere to pick up a passenger and are so carefully managed that we have yet the first accident to chronicle.

A \$75,000 fire in Portland last Friday night burned the block surrounded by 2nd, 3d, E. and F. streets, and the Eagle hotel. The insurance is about half that amount. The evening was calm, and the fire was prevented from spreading to adjacent property.

The new Knights of Pythias hall was lighted up for the first time a few evenings ago and presents a fine appearance. It will be dedicated on the 6th prox. with most elaborate ceremony, the exercises being participated in by many visiting members from various parts of the state.

At a meeting of the Republican precinct committee at noon yesterday, T. B. Bridwell was placed in nomination for constable of this precinct. It was, in the discretion of the committee, deemed best to make no nomination for justice of the peace, and the committee adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.

**Democratic Rally.**

When C. H. Stockton, the chairman of the meeting, introduced Hon. W. T. Burney last evening it was to a fairly filled house. Mr. Burney listened to for forty-five minutes, and was followed by Mr. V. K. Strode, who began by allusion to the present campaign and his pleasure at meeting interested audiences at every point, and thought that the statement of his Republican friends, that the Democratic party was a dead or dying party, was not warranted by what he believed to be the facts. In support of this, he cited the fact that in 1876 Samuel J. Tilden received 4,285,992 votes, being a majority of the popular vote of 145,911, and that in 1880 Hancock got 4,444,952 votes, being within 9,464 votes of the number Garfield received. He thought that a party that could make such a showing as that was not dead, nor even sleeping, and hoped that on the 5th of June Oregon would give evidence of vitality in the Democratic ranks.

On the Chinese question Mr. Strode gave utterance to the opinion that the general attitude of the Republicans on that question was to be considered, and while conceding that the Republicans of this coast were unanimous against further immigration, he claimed that as a national organization the Republican party was not in line with the popular thought. He proceeded to say some complimentary things in regard to our local industries, our advantageous position, etc., and after some personal reference to himself and the position he occupied on the ticket, he bade the audience good-night. His manner and appearance on the platform entitled him to the respectful consideration of all. He was followed by Mr. Cleveland, who used the arguments in favor of Democracy that are underlying the principles and theory of the party, and were consistent in their enunciation of their political faith. At the close a round of cheers for the ticket was in order and the audience dispersed.

**A Little "Singular."**

Beaststeaks and roasts and such like luxuries have recently "ris" in price here. The reason alleged is that the eastern buyers have bought up such enormous numbers of beef cattle and driven them over the mountains that the supply can by no means equal the demand. This is probably true, and yet the Cheney Sentinel is moved to say: "This is an illustration of a singular condition of trade that seems at entire variance with every rule and law of commerce. These beef cattle are first driven over a weary and expensive trail to the Mississippi valley or the plains of Kansas or Nebraska, where they are butchered and retailed from 10 to 12 1/2 cents a pound. Thousands of them are shipped by rail to the ports of the Atlantic, and from there to the continental countries. A recent price current states that American beef sells in the London market for 16 cents per pound; and it will puzzle the profoundest political economist to logically account for the fact that high transportation can be paid for a distance of 10,000 miles and yet permit the product to be sold at four cents a pound cheaper than it brings in the very country where it is produced."

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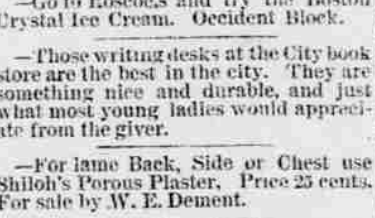
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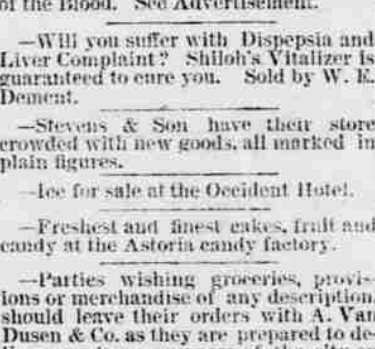

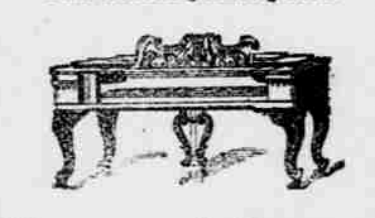
