 ancholy affair took place.

**UNCLE TOM'S CABIN.**  
 An Excellent Play Thoroughly well  
 Performed.

A house filled to overflowing greet-  
 ed the Jay Rial Uncle Tom's Cabin  
 company at Liberty hall last evening,  
 and it seemed to have a corresponding  
 influence on every actor in the com-  
 pany, for they all performed their  
 parts admirably. The version em-  
 braces many new and interesting  
 features which relieve the monotony  
 of the old drama, and clothe it with  
 a new garment as it were, hence those  
 not present last evening should not  
 fail to attend either this afternoon or  
 evening, as they will be rewarded with  
 three hours unrivaled entertainment.  
 The special qualification of the company  
 embrace actors and actresses of rare  
 merit; a pack of veritable blood  
 hounds, which are by the way, thrill-

 was superb, creating a feeling of  
 dread and horror in every heart that  
 gave a wonderfully realistic effect to  
 the well executed rendition of her  
 part. Miss Sallie Partington as  
 "Topsy" was the best ever seen in  
 Astoria, and was thoroughly appre-  
 ciated by the audience. Miss Dolly  
 Florence gave satisfaction as "Aunt  
 Ophelia." Arthur McGregory as  
 "Uncle Tom" elicited rounds of ap-  
 plause. He was simply unsurpassed.  
 Sid. S. Hicks as "Simon Legree" in-  
 terpreted his part in a highly  
 efficient manner, sending a cold shud-  
 der through one as he exempli-  
 fied the well known cruelty of that  
 character. A word of praise should  
 be said of Prof. Jacobson, who is  
 evidently a gentleman of refinement  
 and a thorough musician. The  
 management of this combination is in  
 excellent hands, and we bespeak for

**Alleged Embracery.**

While District Attorney Caples was  
 making his plea in prosecution of  
 Carrie Bradley, in the Portland court-  
 room last Thursday morning, a con-

 Mason and W. S. Beebe, the defend-  
 ant's two lawyers, on a charge of at-  
 tempting to bribe the jury. The case, as  
 stated, leads to the direct inference of  
 their guilt, one of the bailiffs in  
 charge of the jury making positive  
 charge that the lawyers gave him  
 money to give letters to certain jurors,  
 the letters telling those jurors to  
 "stand pat," and that the thing would  
 be made all right.

**A Bravo Act**

Last Thursday night one of Elmore's  
 boats was upset on the bar. The  
 waves were rolling high, and the night  
 being a stormy one, there seemed but  
 little hope for the two occupants to  
 save their lives. Near by were Pierre  
 Sicaurant and his nephew, who, let-  
 ting their nets go, plunged in, and  
 after superhuman exertions, succeeded  
 in rescuing from death the two men,  
 who were well-nigh exhausted. It  
 was a gallant act, and the brave men  
 who risked their own lives to save  
 others should be commended for their  
 dauntless courage.

**The Bradley trial at Portland last**

Thursday ended by the jury finding  
 the defendant guilty of manslaughter.  
 The defense was granted till Wednes-  
 day next to decide upon making a  
 motion for a new trial. It is very un-  
 likely that further effort will be made  
 to save the guilty woman from the  
 consequences of her terrible crime.

**Frank Rose is out of a job.**

He was engineer of the steamer Silva,  
 at Humboldt, Cal., and started the  
 pump to fill the tanks. He went off  
 and forgot all about it, and when he  
 came down in the morning to light  
 the fire, the steamer was at the bot-  
 tom of the bay. The tanks were all  
 full.

**Murder in Tillamook**

On Tuesday, May 30th, an old man  
 named Frakes was shot four times by  
 Nathan Knott, near Bear Camp, Till-  
 amook county, on the Salmon river  
 road. It appears, says the Statesman,  
 that the difficulty arose over a cow,  
 which Frakes had sold to Knott, and  
 which was to be delivered when the  
 money for the same was received, and  
 Knott demanded it before paying  
 the money. The murder was a cold  
 blooded affair, and we understand  
 that a band of vigilants are now in  
 search of the murderer who will be  
 hanged when captured.
