tion of the new Castle Hall of the

ROUTE OF MARCH.

From the O. R. & N. Co.'s dock up Water street to West Sixth street, down Water to Squemoqua, down Squemoqua to Olney, down Olney to Chenamus, down Chenamus to Madison, counter-march up Chenamus to Cass, up Cass to Squemoqua, up Squemoqua to Castle Hall, corner Squemoqua and Hamilton streets.

6. Reception of Grand Lodge and visiting brethren by members of Astor Lodge.
7. Tournament about 4:30 p. m. on Chenamus street, near the Occident hotel.
8. Dedication of Castle Hall by officers of the Grand Lodge, ceremonies commencing at 8 p. m.
9. Oration by Hon. H. Y. Thompson.
10. Presentation of banners by Grand Chancellor D. E. Buchanan.
11. Grand uniform ball at the skating rink, commencing immediately after the conclusion of ceremonies at the hall. The new hall will be thrown open to those who prefer a pleasant social reunion after the dedication to tripping the light fantastic toe. Parrot's string band will furnish music for the ball.

Roscoe, the well-known caterer, will be found at Liberty Hall after 10 o'clock, where guests will find ample provision made for the inner man, for one dollar.

The matinee and evening performances yesterday of the Uncle Tom Cabin Company again afforded enjoyment to the theater-going public. 'Tis a pleasure to see a drama so well put on the stage as the Jay Bird company present that great historic drama.

The building "boom" seems to have just got under way. The question in the mind of a builder is, not so much "what will it cost?" as "where can I get my lumber?" The mills can not keep up with the demand, and it has been so for the last ten months.

Last Friday night some thieves who were evidently trying to get into C. Brown's house, became frightened, and ran away. The strange part of it is that they left behind a half dozen new brooms of a peculiar brand. If any one is out any brooms, he, she or they can get them by applying to Mr. Brown, at the Custom House.

Under "New To-day" appears an advertisement of bids for the construction of a three-story brick building, 50x100 feet, on the lot southeast corner Main and Squemoqua streets. This building when finished will be a most desirable addition to our city and a substantial monument to the enterprise of the Odd Fellows of Astoria.

A few days ago a Portland paper published an item concerning this place, given it probably by some beat who was refused credit here, saying that Astoria was "dull;" that the merchants were "despondent," etc. In a conversation with three collectors yesterday, myself for the time being appearing in that useful capacity, one said that out of one hundred bills presented by him he was asked to wait for but two; another said that he never saw money plentiful among business men, and the third said that the only inconvenience he labored under was that he could get no silver; that it was very scarce, but every man that he went to with a bill either "flooded down a 20" or gave him a check.

The fact is that there is no place in Oregon where times are better, work in greater demand, or money plentiful than right here in Astoria.

Prof. Fred Mayer is meeting with marked success in his musical instruction. More advanced pupils can be accommodated with lessons at their own houses at the monthly rate of \$8.

Col. Dorney's Speech.

The meeting held last night was the last of the campaign. A stand was erected at the corner of Main and Chenamus streets, from which the speaker, P. S. Dorney, of California, held forth. The gentleman's discourse occupied something over two hours.

About eight o'clock the meeting was called to order by state central committee man C. H. Stockton, who in a few well-timed remarks introduced the speaker of the evening. Mr. Dorney was received with applause, and the following is a brief synopsis of his speech. After reviewing the history and interests of Astoria, the speaker dwelt on Republican action in a very uncompromising manner, and explained in a forcible way his views upon the tariff as affecting local industries.

Mr. Dorney denounced his political opponents as a party of absorption. He referred to the monopoly of rivers, lakes, forests and lands and described the monopoly of fur and fish in Alaska, and also went into the Chinese question in detail.

He accused Mr. George of sundry irregularities. Personally he knew but little of George and less of Fenton; but politically he thought one was the representative of a party composed of monopolists, and the other the representative of a party of the people.

Mr. Dorney spoke of the danger of socialism in general and particular. He pronounced a eulogium on the character and services of W. L. Worthington, which was received with applause. The meeting adjourned after a session of two and one-half hours, with three cheers for the ticket and three more for the eloquent Californian.

Mr. Dorney is a gentleman of fine presence and makes a good appearance on the platform. He is known as an efficient campaign speaker, and was listened to with attention during the course of his extended remarks, by the assemblage in attendance. Red lights flashed at intervals, though before the conclusion the mellow rays of the moon lit up the scene.

Don't Forget it.

It is just as well to remind certain parties that when a gentleman pays his money for a reserved seat at the theatre, that that seat is his exclusive and individual property for that evening. He has paid for it just the same as if he had paid for a beefsteak or a cigar; he can give the beefsteak to the fish, or throw the cigar in the street, or occupy his seat or not, just as he sees fit; but no one has a right to take the seat that has passed out of the hands of the ticket seller, unless he holds the check which secures that seat for that special evening. Of course, no one would intentionally violate this well-established rule; but, sometimes, people forget, and a gentle reminder is not amiss.

Council Proceedings.

The city council met last Friday evening, Mayor Hahn presiding. Present, Councilman Case, Dement, Taylor and Wright. Absent, Currier and Spexarth. In attendance F. C. Norris, auditor and clerk.

The mayor returned ordinance 465 without his approval, and stated his reasons for the veto. The mayor's action was sustained by a unanimous vote. An ordinance declaring the probable cost of repairing a certain portion of Condon's street was read first and second times, and on motion was read third time under suspension of the rules, and passed. On motion council adjourned.
