We regret to learn that Tom Crang is not expected to live. His parents and friends have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.

The H. W. Dudley, forty-three days from Hong Kong, arrived in yesterday morning. She was passed by the health officer at noon. She has 392 Chinese on board.

The last of the visiting Knights went home yesterday morning. They were all complimentary in their opinion of Astor Lodge and the beautiful Castle hall just dedicated.

Gid Richardson is down from Westport, looking hearty; he reports everything lively in that burg, and goes back next Tuesday. Gid is doing well and deserves his good fortune.

The Olympia Transcript has a two column delinquent tax list of lands belonging to the N. P. R. Co., advertised for sale. "Odd sections" are evidently not in present demand in Chehalis County.

COMPLETE COUNTY RETURNS.

The Result as Determined by Official Count.

A Close Vote on Judge, Clerk, and Assessor.

Below we give the full and correct returns for this county, as passed on by the official canvassers yesterday afternoon. The figures can be relied upon for accuracy, and give the whole vote in detail.

In Astoria precinct P. H. Fox was elected Justice of the Peace; T. B. Bridwell, Constable. In upper Astoria, J. L. Strange; Young's River, J. W. Coffinbury; Fish-hawk, J. W. Walker; Mishawaka, Kimberlin, were elected Justices of the Peace.

F. D. Winton's office is removed to the Pythian building.

At the last meeting of the Portland council, the contract for building a dredge was awarded to Honeyman and company.

The captain of the Chinese steamer Amery is also in trouble, the charge being alleged violation of the passenger act. He is in Portland to see what the damages will be.

Sixteen cases coal oil, two second hand cooking stoves and a large lot of useful kitchen ware and sundries, to be sold at auction at Holden's at two o'clock this afternoon.

Since August 1, 1881, 153 vessels have left the Columbia river for Europe with wheat and flour. Of this number 70 are known to have arrived out and 2 are known to have been wrecked. The arrivals out include all departures prior to Jan. 1st, and seven that sailed after that date. This leaves about 80 on the way, several of which are due. There are nine vessels in the Columbia river, most of which are loading wheat and salmon. The surplus stock of wheat at Portland as well as in the interior of Oregon is quite small, and after the vessels now under engagement complete their cargoes, little will be done in the way of loading others until the new crop comes in next August.
