Nature's Wonders.

Among the many wonderful freaks of nature that constantly attract the attention of the traveler in eastern Oregon and Washington Territory, may be mentioned the hot lake in Union county, six miles from the city of Union. This remarkable evidence of nature's handiwork is situated at the foot of the mountain range, surrounding Grand Ronde valley, and is a clear placid sheet of boiling water, about one hundred yards from any standpoint on its bank. The water arises from one main artery assisted by smaller tributaries, and the main artery pours forth a stream about as large in circumference as a barrel. This water is hot enough to boil meat, or cook eggs in the time usually required to properly prepare these articles for table use.

Within the past few days the discovery has been made of a large tract of very rich farming land, lying about half way between the Northern Pacific railroad and a point on the Snake river about ten miles above Ainsworth. The tract lies in the midst of sage brush, and is about two thousand acres in extent, and exceedingly rich. About twenty claims have already been taken. There is likely to be some difficulty in getting water. Parties are now engaged in sinking wells. If they are successful in the search for water there will be a rush for the oasis.

During the month of May the Northern Pacific land office at Cheney sold 31,562 acres of land for \$83,180. During the same time town lots to the value of \$32,500 were sold. The Tacoma office sold, during May 557 acres for \$1,728. Total sales for May, \$87,958.
