The Oregonian makes a good point in saying: "As a matter of fact the Republican platform this year was much less emphatic as a pronouncement for a protective tariff than in former years. It was cautious, and even timid, in comparison with the bold and dogmatic utterances of the party. In so far as the policy of "protection" was urged during the canvass, the wool question was presented as its great feature of interest to the people of Oregon. Now the principal increase of the Republican majority was in Multnomah county, and Multnomah has no wool to be "protected," nor indeed any other product. But Umatilla, the great wool-producing district of the state, where protection of wool, if it be so important a question as represented, might be expected to move the voters to unanimous action, gives a large Democratic majority—about the same in fact, as that of two years ago. It may be doubted whether "protection" really made a difference of 100 voters in the state."

An inter-state commerce commission is the next thing the country is threatened with. We already have in course of construction a Utah commission and a tariff commission, and if the bank people, hadn't been uncommonly smart, we should have had a National Bank commission. It will strike some captious sort of people that the "public business," which we hear so much about but see so little of, might be greatly facilitated if our Senators and Representatives were to take off their coats, roll up their sleeves and give some personal attention to matters in which the public is most nearly interested. There is no reason why they should not perform all the legislation necessary to a revision of the tariff, to the regulation of railroads and to the adjustment of commerce, without letting out the work by contract.

We hope the scraping now in progress on the bar will be continued until there is plenty of water to float any ship that floats, and not be stopped when it is half done. Whenever a few feet more water is obtained the fact should be telegraphed to the Maritime Register and other shipping newspapers, so that ship-owners may be apprised of the fact, and allow their vessels to be sent here for this season's crop. We notice a Callao freight circular says that the large ships from that port will go seeking to San Francisco and the smaller to the Columbia river, and so it will be until deeper water is obtained and the news sent abroad.

FURTHER legal efforts to set aside the death sentence which has been pronounced, seem hopeless in the Giteau case. The culprit himself has outlined the only policy which may delay the time of his hanging. If he becomes crazy, he will have to be kept in confinement until reason returns, and he may be crazy in real earnest, or simulate insanity so closely that he can secure a reprieve. It is his only chance, he knows it, and the various indications of mental decay which may be observed are more than likely assumed. He has studied the matter so thoroughly that he must know precisely what to do under the circumstances.

THE manufacturers of spurious government bonds have adopted the tactics which have proven so successful in the case of high-toned bank defaulters. When these people steal enough, the banks are willing to let them off without punishment, if they will return half of the plunder. The government may possibly let the bond rascals go free if they will only return the stolen plates and stop further operations.

BLAINE has declined to be a candidate for congressman at large from Maine. He will enter into the campaign, however, and exert all of his influence for whatever ticket may be nominated. Had he consented to run, he would have incurred the hostility of the many politicians who want the place, the power of the administration would have been exerted quietly to secure his defeat, and he might have failed of an election. In that case, his prospects for a nomination by the next national convention would have vanished.

THE members of the Massachusetts legislature receive for their arduous labors the princely salary of \$500 a year, but the house, yielding to the extravagant spirit of the age, has passed a bill increasing this sum to \$650. The senate protests against any such prodigality of expenditure and refuses to concur in the bill, and the war which impends between the two branches of this ponderous legislative body threatens to last as long as the congressional deadlock.

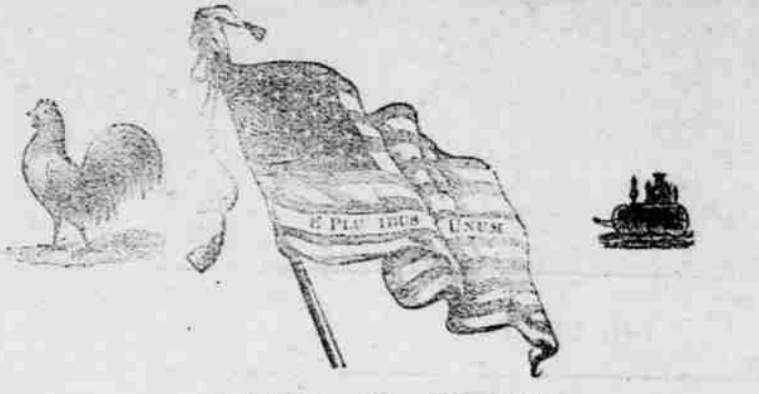
