Pioneer's Reunion.

The tenth annual reunion of the Pioneers of Oregon, was held at Salem last Thursday. It was a joyous occasion to all who participated. Ex-Senator James Kelly being introduced, alluded briefly to the wilderness existing in Oregon when the early pioneers first entered its boundaries, recounted the dominion of the Hudson Bay company in the early day, before any form of governmental law was or could be enacted by the incoming American settlers; spoke of the formation of the provisional government by the settlers in the year 1843; outlined the state of affairs existing on this northwest coast, under the joint occupancy of American and British subjects, whose respective governments claimed the country and for years disputed for its final possession; briefly outlined the coming, the objects of it, and the trials and hardships of the early missionaries, showing that their intentions at first were simply to christianize the Indian tribes, but whose labors finally aided so materially in the settlement and early development of the country; spoke of the class known as "the free trappers" who, in the course of their predatory wanderings, drifted into the Willamette Valley and became "Independent" settlers, aided by their boldness, energy and inherent love of country, in finally wresting this rich domain from the dominion of the Hudson Bay company, and consequently from the British government; detailed the efforts of the settlers and their few friends in Congress to secure the extension of the United States laws over the young territory, and the long and persistent neglect of Congress to heed the petitions and urgent wants of the new settlers; paid a merited tribute, in passing, to Senator Linn, the best friend the pioneers ever had in those early days of struggle and privation; spoke of the first attempts to form a provisional government by the settlers which took place in 1841, appointing a committee, into whose hands was placed the responsible duty of administering certain laws and regulations. This committee was short-lived, going out of existence in the fall of that year. In 1843 another effort was made in the same direction, which met with better success, and finally resulted in the formation of what is known as the provisional government of the territory, which was consummated at a meeting held at Champag on the second day of May, 1843. A legislative committee was elected to frame necessary laws, their session being limited to six days, and their emolument being \$1.25 per day, to be raised by subscription. The committee reported to a general meeting held on the 5th of July following. Their report was adopted and the organic law was formed and went into operation under an executive committee of three, consisting of David Hall, Alanson Burr and Joseph Gale. The government thus formed was an important factor or agency in finally compelling the attention of congress and the final adjustment of the vexed question of joint occupation of this section of our government and that of Great Britain, and the settlement of the dispute between the two governments as to the boundary lines; recounted the fact of the Whitman massacre and its startling effect upon the young and unprotected settlement; then related the promptness with which volunteers were raised, and the offending tribe quickly and severely chastised. The speaker spoke of the final and formal recognition of our existence and wants by the congress of the United States, and the establishment of a territorial government over Oregon.

The latest efforts of the iconoclasts is an attempt to prove that Thomas Jefferson was not the author of the Declaration of Independence. Those dreadful image breakers will next assert that the story of George Washington and the cherry tree is but a myth.

One hundred and seven years ago to-day was fought the Battle of Bunker Hill, and while liberty is loved and courage honored, will be applauded the spirit that stirred the souls of the men who made that memorable stand against the English power.

The editorial Bunsbys of California agree in saying that the recent election in this state "shows that it is impossible to make an issue on a question where there is no difference of opinion."

It is considered probable that a bill will shortly be reported from the senate territorial committee favoring the admission of Washington as a state, "With Idaho attachment."

Long quotations from the Argonaut are not so numerous in our exchanges as they were previous to election.
