The Fourth of July.

Two weeks from to-day the nation will celebrate its 106th birthday. The United States is the only nation that has a birthday to celebrate, and though the baby nation of the world, yet it makes a tremendous annual fuss over that important natal event. About the first of June the shack waters of patriotism begin to turn, and by the 1st of July the flood is at its height. Each locality has its own style of celebrating the Fourth; some by getting gloriously drunk, and some by going out in the woods and suffering alleged pleasure eating cold victuals there; (this is usually styled a picnic, and is looked back upon in shuddering remembrance); in general the "celebration" has two distinctive features: reading the declaration of independence, delivering an "oration," and giving a ball. The last is like a motion to adjourn, "always in order," or like a bitton, "sure to come off."

It is a question how much patriotism has to do with celebrating our great national holiday. Some look upon it as a sort of religious duty; something that must be done, decently and in order; others consider it as a day set apart by congress and Divine Providence as a time wherein they can advertise their stock in trade, whether it be ready-made clothes, gab, check, ice-cream, soda-water, impudence, eloquence, density or what not. But the regular old-fashioned idea about it, the idea that we have always believed to be the right one, is that it is a day that we should all celebrate by having "a good time," a day that we could look back upon with a pleasure that would begin to fade just when the months would again bring around the time when our mind would be filled with pleasurable anticipations of the coming Fourth. Just what "a good time" is, is a matter capable of a wide difference of opinion. Our definition of Liberty is just this: that we have a perfect right to do just what we please; provided we do not interfere with any one else's right to do just as he pleases. And in having a good time one can take the full need of enjoyment in doing what will please himself, looking out that his actions do not interfere with others rights. As far as we of Astoria are concerned, it seems pretty well established that our celebration this year will consist of a Firemen's tournament, and a ball in the evening under the auspices of No. 1. If there is anything else on the programme we have not heard of. The fact that our fire department comprises the majority of our leading citizens and business men, and the additional fact that the department as a body, has a reputation unequalled by any other north of San Francisco, make it eminently just and proper that it should assume a prominent part in the celebration of the day. But yet, as a matter of business it seems to us, something additional could be gotten up. It is just this way. A display or parade would attract a large crowd here; who would all spend more or less money, and "make business," and though from a high patriotic standpoint it may appear almost sacrilegious to mention money making in connection with a proper celebration of the day when the American eagle soars and screams, and has all its tail feathers pulled out by the average orator; yet it is not as a primary but as a secondary adjunct that we mention it. There yet remain two weeks in which arrangements can be made and perfected, looking to the disposal of such attractions as will bring a crowd to our pleasant little city.

Postoffice Order. First Assistant Postmaster General Patton has issued an order forbidding postmasters to allow one person to call for a list of names, keeping others in waiting, and directing them to require the person attempting to do so through a list to fall back and come up in the rear of others after calling for a single name, and in the most explicit terms postmasters are forbidden to keep general callers waiting in order to pick out the mail for an indefinite number of persons. They are required to treat such persons calling as one person, and require them when served to pass on and give others a chance. The Postmaster General holds that to permit one person to call for a list of names gives those embraced in the list an undue advantage, and discourages the renting of boxes and takes that much from the postal service, as all money paid for box rent goes to the government and not to the postmaster. "Anything here for Jim Smith?" "No!" "Anything here for Joe Saul?" "Now you go down to the end of the line." Down he goes, and in a quarter of an hour here he is again. "Anything for Joe Saul, now?" "No!" "Anything for Peter?" "Get out, go back to the end of the line." That's about the way it works. The order is a good one in theory but is ridiculous when attempted to be enforced.

We read in Homer's Iliad of the famous Grecian heroes who made Athens resound with the clash of contending arms twenty centuries ago. How well they fought the listening years have heard; how greatly triumphant the heroes that Greece nurtured in her glory's prime, the history of the long line from Pericles to Bozzaria attests. By the blue waters of the Egean sea, in their own Attic peninsula, those warriors had their brilliant day. On those moist northwestern shores degenerate sons of worthy sires the modern Greek in quarrelsome cups fights with the old time valor, and meeting no foe man worthy of his steel is fain to sheathe his blade in the bosom of a compeot. In battle, in the fullness of his pride and strength, little reck the soldier if the hissing bullet sing his sudden requiem, or the cords of life are severed by the sharp steel. So in the sanguinary saloon fight little cares the descendant of Theseus and Alcibiades, whether the crashing booted smash his skull in gory splinters or the insinuating dirk knife-gash him in the jugular vein.
