A Clever Exploit.

CAPTAIN BURROWS, of the steamer Rio Grande, has succeeded in accomplishing an unprecedented feat. When his steamer was discovered to be on fire at sea, nine miles beyond the Delaware breakwater, he overhauled an Italian bark, the Beppino A, successfully and safely, and, without the slightest panic, transferred his ninety-seven passengers to her, navigated the burning vessel to a shoal near the breakwater and sank her to the deck beams. This was the only means of putting out the fire, which was in the hold of the ship among eight hundred bales of cotton. It was impossible to reach the fire on the Rio Grande or to successfully battle with it in the usual way by pouring water through the hatches. To completely submerge all of the steamer below the main deck hatches was the only recourse. To accomplish this without serious injury to the steamer was no easy task. But Captain Burrows managed it in twenty-seven hours after the conflagration was discovered, and not only this, but in twenty-four hours more he had extinguished the flames, pumped out and raised the ship and was once again ready to start the engines and steam for New York. At the Delaware breakwater the Rio Grande again overhauled the Italian bark, retransferred the passengers to the steamer and resumed the voyage to New York with the steamer as sound as a dollar and no other injury except to the cargo.

Eddystone Lighthouse.

The Eddystone lighthouse, of wonderful history, started on a new career last week. Swenton's famous structure, erected over 100 years ago, has been replaced by a higher, stronger and more modern structure, which its architect, Douglass, believes good for more than another hundred years. The first lighthouse on Eddystone reef was built of wood and stone in 1696, and was carried away by the sea only seven years later. The second one, built in the same manner in 1768, was burned in 1755. Then followed Swenton's work of art, which is still standing. But it was found about five years ago that although the tower was still sound, the ledge on which it stood had become undermined by the waves, and there was danger of an ultimate collapse. The new lighthouse stands on another part of the ledge, one that at high tide is always below the surface. The lower part of the tower which is bolted securely to the bed-rock, is a cylinder 44 feet in diameter and 22 feet high, the top of it, being 2 feet 6 inches above high water of spring tides. Here, therefore is a landing stage. From this base springs a tapering tower 35 feet in diameter at the base and eighteen feet at the top, which is 138 feet above the rock foundation. The lantern room has two oil lamps of 722-candle power together, and the range of the flash is 17 1/2 nautical miles. The lighthouse is of granite throughout, and the formal "opening" was the lighting of the lamps on the night of their use by the Prince of Wales.

As Usual.

excuse for a "pretext," and further inasmuch as they were never in fewer numbers in proportion to former immigration statistics than at present, the discovery of our gelid contemporary is hardly in strict accordance with existing facts. Possibly the stern rule of Bismarck is the "pretext" that those dreadful fellows the Germans have for their audacity in coming over by the hundred thousand this year.

THE present strike in the state of Ohio and Illinois has thrown sixty thousand men out of employment. On the basis of five persons to each striker, this would indicate that 360,000 people are directly affected by the strike.

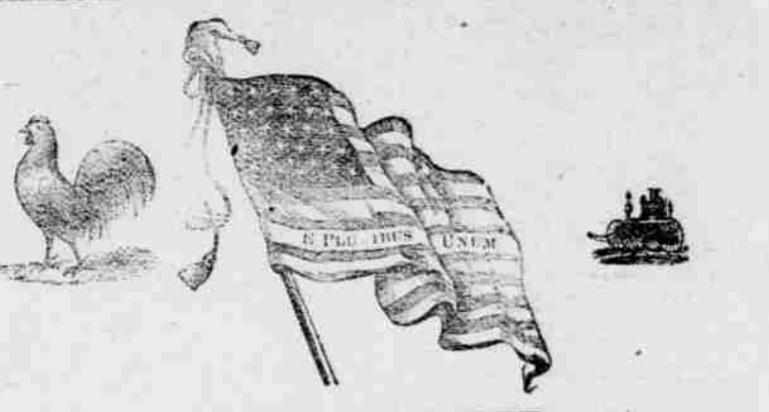
