The harvesting of barley has begun in Walla Walla. A good yield is expected.

The State of California is due from San Francisco this morning. The Oregon left Portland at 12 last night.

A terrific tornado which swept through central Iowa last Saturday night killed fifty people, wounded one hundred, and destroyed over one million dollars worth of property.

One drunk and two disorderly were brought from the cooler yesterday and allowed to enrich the city treasury in the sum of \$32. These things come high but some will have 'em.

The dead body of Martin Watson who was drowned last Sunday evening was found in a net in the north channel Monday afternoon and conveyed to Franklin's undertaking rooms, from which it was buried yesterday afternoon.

The new steamer Gen. Miles is having her machinery thoroughly overhauled and tested. Thus far it has met every expectation, and the builder, Mr. Jones, of Delaware, is confident that she will give satisfaction to her owners.

Mr. H. L. Pike is getting up a fine curtain for Liberty Hall, which will combine the useful and ornamental. It will afford a good medium for advertising and will be at the same time an improvement on the present antique arrangement.

On account of the rain yesterday the excursion of the Fleetwood to Fort Clatsop was postponed till to-morrow afternoon, when, weather permitting, our citizens can take a few hours' recreation in viewing the historic ground where Lewis and Clarke wintered in eighteen hundred and ever so few.

To-day there are all sorts of goings on up above. The sun crosses the line, enters the sign of the scorpion, swings higher toward the zenith and shortens one's shadow to its smallest limit; the moon is in apogee, Mercury is in aphelion, Venus swings farthest to the north, and a vast array of other celestial pranks are billed for the occasion.

The State Democratic Convention of California met at San Jose yesterday to nominate candidates for governor and lieutenant-governor. Hearst of San Francisco and Daggett of Siskiyou seem to have the call for the nominations respectively, though many old timers claim that Hearst hasn't got money enough to get the nomination. He is only worth \$20,000,000.

Observance of the Fourth.

The following general order has been issued by Brigadier-General Miles: The 100th anniversary of our National Independence will be appropriately observed at all military posts in this Department on the 4th of July, proximo. All business, except the necessary military duties, will be suspended, and the national salute fired as prescribed by regulations. The use of fireworks on military reservations will be prohibited when public property will be endangered thereby. Post commanders are charged with the execution of this order.

Dangerous Condition.

We understand that the condition of Scott, who was shot a few days ago, was yesterday afternoon so much worse that Carlson was held under arrest in increased bail of \$5,000, in default of which he was committed to jail. The unfortunate condition of Scott is a matter of sincere regret to his friends and acquaintances. It is alleged that he was simply passing by the house when he received the contents of Carlson's gun in his shoulder, and was not even cognizant that Carlson lived there, much less had any intent to pay his domicile a visit.

That Fish Wheel.

A gentleman who came down from the Cascades, says the Standard, states that one of the fish wheels there caught 4,100 salmon in 24 hours. The fish appear to be running in vast numbers, as he saw a man with a dip net catch 78 at the head of an eddy in less than hour. He caught three at one scoop. The fish in making the passage of the cataract are obliged to keep close to the shore and so are readily captured. A law must be passed by the next legislature to put a stop to this wholesale destruction of salmon.

Another Body Found.

On the 14th inst., on the beach and opposite Mr. J. L. Stout's old farm house, the body of a young man about 20 years of age, rather dark complexion, and had two very prominent teeth in the upper jaw. The body was naked except pants, which were of fine black cloth; it was 5 feet 7 inches in height and of ordinary frame. A coffin was taken out from here and a decent burial given the body, near where it was found. Further information may be had from Rees Williams, who assisted at the burial. R. W. Hwaco, W. T.

Lost Off Point Lobos.

The British steamer Escanabria, loaded with wheat for a Portuguese port, went to sea from San Francisco last Monday afternoon. When about five miles outside the heads she capsized and sank, and so far as is known all hands are lost. The terrible disaster was seen from the shore, but, of course, it was impossible to render the unfortunate crew any assistance. It is thought a large quantity of coal on the deck made the vessel top heavy.

Portland's Election.

The family quarrel in the Republican party in Portland culminated last Monday in the election of Dr. Chapman for mayor, by the large majority of 542. The bolter's ticket for councilman was also elected. There is a moral to the story, but it wouldn't adorn any tale worth relating and can be left unspoken.
