Irate Mongolians. SERIOUS discussion is reported as progressing in Tsung Ti Yamen, upon the course to be pursued respecting America's anti-Chinese action. One party is said to welcome it as affording an opportunity for severing all relations with the United States, while the majority propose to await further developments; but all agree in declaring that Chinese rights have been ruthlessly disregarded, and that the American government has opened itself to retaliatory action, if such be deemed expedient. The question is raised at Tien Tsin whether China's assistance in Korean negotiations should not be summarily withdrawn, as it is believed Commodore Shufeldt could not proceed conveniently without Chinese co-operation. In addition to the ill feeling caused by the anti-emigrant law, much irritation is felt over the publication of the letter attributed to Shufeldt, in which the empress is accused of immorality. But for China's known slowness to act suddenly on provocation, troublesome consequences might be apprehended. In the best view of affairs it is plain that diplomatic intercourse at Peking will require very cautious handling.

Under the new Geneva award bill ship owners are to be reimbursed for the extra premiums they had to pay to insurance companies. Indirect damages, like these, were not contemplated by the original award, but on account of the red tape surrounding the whole business, most of the money paid by England is still on hand. It is natural that ships should charge enough extra, as freight, to cover the extra cost of insurance, so that they have really lost nothing. The people who paid the freights, in turn, reimbursed themselves by charging their prices, and the matter can be traced until the loss is known to have fallen upon the nation as an entirety. Public justice would have been more fully effected, if the fund now in hand were to be turned into the treasury, where congress could fight over it, and finally, perhaps, give it away.

HENRY GEORGE is making his appearance as one of the big men in the management of the Irish business. It is generally said that he is "running" Michael Davitt, that Davitt is "running" the Land League. Henry George is a peculiar and eccentric individual, who would rank amongst the foremost thinkers of the day if he would let his reputation rest upon his celebrated book. He is wholly bound up in his theory of the ownership of land, and will be an unsafe and impractical leader. But he is above and beyond dishonesty and money-grabbing propensities which have disgraced some who have been connected with these movements. He cannot be diverted from his purpose, and will be a more dangerous man for the British government than any who have appeared as agitators.

As long as standing armies were kept in the southern states, there were murders and outrages almost without limit, and there was scarcely the semblance of government. The stronger the military forces were made, the worse became the trouble, and it seemed as if there could be no peace until every southern man had been driven from his home. When there was a change of policy, when the soldiers were withdrawn there was an end of violence, law was again respected and there is the same peace and quiet in the south that prevails everywhere in the Union. England might learn a lesson from this experience in dealing with Ireland; it will be necessary to drive every Irishman away, or else allow them the right of self-

government, under British protection. IMMIGRANTS are pouring in at the rate of 100,000 a month. When our yearly immigration was what it now aggregates monthly, Macaulay, speaking of our republican institutions and their perpetuity, said that we were "all sail and no anchor;" and that when our population increased to 200 to the square mile we would go to pieces. If the present rate of increase holds good we will (taking the natural increase of 33 per cent. decennially) reach that density of population in the year 2384.

THE Maritime Register says shanghaiing in New York harbor seems almost an impossibility in these days. But a soldier, who wooed the rosy god too ardently, found out to his cost that it was quite possible. He woke out of his sleep to find himself regularly shipped on a British vessel without first going through the formality of giving his consent. THE Cincinnati Inquirer says that during the last thirty years the United States government has given away to railroad corporations 191,653,401 acres of public land, 21,554,201 acres more than are comprised in the great state of Texas. Yet there is scarcely a case on record where a railroad has fulfilled its part of the contract made with the government when the land grant was made.

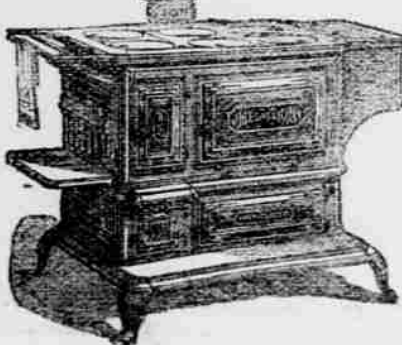
