—Hansen Bros. have begun the new hotel for Theo. Bromser.

—Carl Adler calls attention to the fact that he has a large stock of fireworks.

—A. M. Johnson is getting the "boas" sign. Pike takes the contract by the square yard.

—Fighting has begun in Zululand; in Egypt they are only quarreling, and haven't got to blows yet.

—The M. E. church is having its spire fixed up. This is one of the neatest little churches in the state.

At half past two, this afternoon, E. C. Holden will sell a quantity of timbers and planking at the ship yard of the I. S. N. Company.

—A. V. Allen just across the street is fixing up his building so nicely that it reminds us that our corner would be all the better for a little paint.

—The Jas. Duncan which has been lying here for thirty days, went up the river yesterday, having been chartered by Sibson, Church & Co.

—George's majority foots up 3,228; Moody's, 1,295; Earhart's, 2,391; Hirsch's, 2,419; Lord's, 1,233. That shows how much scratching prevailed, even on the state ticket.

—Olympians complain because their postmaster makes them deposit 75 cents security for the postoffice box keys. Here it takes a dollar ante to come in, but no one minds it.

—The California convention of the Democracy is still in session trying to nominate a governor. Stoneman is the best candidate they have, for he is a clean man, but he has no show. Hearst, "the man with the sack," will secure the nomination.

—We were favored yesterday with a call from Bishop Morris, who is sojourning at his Astoria residence. He will officiate at Grace church tomorrow at morning and evening service. Holy communion will be administered at the morning service.

—The new idea is to have the hand photographed. We have held some hands, sadly confesses the Standard, that are as indelibly fixed on our memory as the photographer's art could fix them and others—without a trump. This is a double action joke.

—Guiteau swings next Friday. Erostratus, the wretch who fired the Ephesian dome twenty four centuries ago, did it to place his name perpetually on the lips of men.
