The Columbia is due this morning. She has 141 cabin passengers and 274 on deck.

A Port Townsend dispatch of the 23d reports the Shubrick ashore on Dungeness spit, but she arrived in all right at ten o'clock last night.

Mr. E. C. Holden and daughter returned yesterday from a brief visit to the metropolis.

There will be Divine service in the Congregational church this morning and evening. Rev. E. R. Loomis officiating.

J. D. Merryman arrived down yesterday. He made some fine catches of fish while in the Willamette valley.

The S. G. Reed will be down tomorrow in place of the Bonita, which goes on the ways for repairs and alterations.

Rev. T. W. Walters and family are on the Columbia and will arrive here this A. M. It is probable that Mr. Walters will assume the pastorate of the Congregational church.

Beyond a display of fireworks, Portland will not make much fuss about the Fourth. There will be two excursions to this place—the Columbians with their engine and the East Portland band, and the A. A. McCully.

The school was founded by the present Bishop of Oregon, named for Bishop Scott, who preceded Bishop Morris, and who had located a school at Oswego during his life, but which, for obvious reasons, was removed to Portland. The school building is situated in a high, healthy part of the city, and is large and commodious, giving the best of accommodations to those from a distance who wish board in the institution.

GREAT FIRE IN PORTLAND.

Burning of the Pacific Dock

At a few minutes before noon yesterday the Pacific dock at the foot of Salmon street, Portland, was discovered to be in flames, and despite the most strenuous exertions of the fire department, was completely destroyed. Brooks Trevett, of Columbia No. 2, narrowly escaped death in the flames. The extensive spice mills of J. F. Jones and company were also totally destroyed. Their loss is about \$20,000; insured for \$8,000. Sibson, Church & Co., lose \$25,000 on wheat, wool and sacks, fully insured. Frank Bros., machinery, \$20,000, insured; Lowndale, Catlin, Ladd and Holmes, the owners of the dock, lose \$15,000, insured. Other losses on goods and material stored will aggregate \$15,000, making a total loss of about \$100,000. The net lost above salvage and insurance, will however, be under \$30,000.

The Celebration.

At the last meeting of the Firemen's committee of arrangements, the following was decided upon as the official rules and regulations for the day. A copy of this got up in appropriate shape will be sent in tomorrow morning's mail to every fire company and newspaper office in Oregon and Washington Territory.

RULES OF THE DAY.

The tournament will be free to all Steam Engines, Hand Engines, Hoses, and Hook & Ladder Companies in the State of Oregon and Washington Territory.

1st.—Steam Engines to run 100 yards; Hose Company to run 300 yards, lay 100 feet of hose and throw water. \$100.00 to first, \$50.00 to second.

2nd.—Steam Engines to station with cold water, lay 100 feet of hose and throw water 100 feet from nozzle. \$50.00 to first.

3rd.—Hand Engines to run 100 yards; hose cart to run 300 yards, lay 100 feet of hose, break coupling, attach pipe and throw water. \$75.00 to first.

4th.—Hose Companies, of 12 men, to run 600 yards with 300 feet of hose on reel, either jumper or carriage \$75.00 to first, \$25.00 to second.

5th.—Hook & Ladder Companies to run 300 yards, limited to 30 men, and get man on top of 30-foot ladder. \$50.00 to first.

6th.—Hose Companies, any team, to "make" and "break" five couplings in "line" hose. \$40.00 to first.

7th.—Grand sweepstakes foot-race, for any Fireman of any Department on the northwest coast; to run 300 yards; Foreman to certify active membership for 30 days; the Illinois State Rules to govern. \$30.00 to first, \$10.00 to second.

All Prizes will be in U. S. gold coin, to be given at 4:45 P. M. on the day of contest.

1st.—All Hose Carts or Carriages in the steamer contest will be required to carry 350 feet of hose on reel, with 12 men, to break coupling at the 100 feet and attach pipe and throw water.

2nd.—Hand Engine contest will be governed by the same rule as steamers, 12 men to hose cart, 45 men to brakes.

3rd.—The 600 yards race for carriages or jumpers, 12 men, with 350 feet of hose, straight away.

4th.—The Judges will consist of five chief Engineers of different departments.

5th.—All contests to start from the top of the Alarm Bell.

An ordinance was prepared, but upon discussion it was deemed expedient to pass it, and at an adjourned meeting held at half-past eight last evening, an ordinance was read first and second times and passed on its third reading, under the suspension of rules by a unanimous vote. The ordinance, in substance, recites the facts in the case and directs the street superintendent to close up the roadway by the erection of fences as specified in the special wording thereof. And so the matter stands at the present writing. We hope that it can even yet be so adjusted that travel between here and uptown shall not be suspended, to the great detriment of our citizens in general, and the prosperity of both sections.

Lost on Clatsop Spit

On the 16th inst., a fishing boat with — Nelson and N. W. Harriman, started in at dusk from outside the bar, but were thrown on Clatsop spit, the boat capsizing as she struck. Harriman was drowned, but Nelson managed to scramble up on the inverted boat, and was carried to sea on the outgoing tide. From Friday night to Monday morning he drifted and finally was thrown on the beach below Tillamook, from whence he made his way back to town. He had a terrible experience and suffered almost death itself in the sixty hours he drifted over the sea.
