Two Assassinations.

The hanging of Guiteau calls forcibly to mind the tragic ending of that other assassin, John Wilkes Booth, the murderer of President Lincoln, who was shot in a Maryland barn in May, 1865, by Boston Corbett. The fever of indignation that found speedy relief in the killing of the chief conspirator in Lincoln's untimely taking off, had no corresponding vent in the last damning tragedy, and for a year the American nation has presented the most extraordinary spectacle that could be imagined—50,000,000 people waiting "to see what would be done with Guiteau," waiting to hear the finale, and note the fall of the curtain on the greatest tragedy ever played on the world's stage.

The wretch who was buried in the Washington jail yard yesterday was impelled to do his awful deed from very different motives than those which inspired Booth to take the life of Lincoln. Both were the exponents of devilish creeds that however divergent their source, lead to one common conclusion: Booth was a political fanatic; intense, imaginative, impulsive; who thought the South was "wronged," and was entitled to vengeance. Guiteau was a calculating, passionless creature, who, failing in his personal schemes for advancement, allowed his natural shrewdness to be overcome by the momentum of revengeful feeling. Apart from any other expression of sentiment it may in general be said that the entire nation is glad that the horrible business is over and the law's stern demands have been complied with, and would be doubly glad if it could be arranged that never again would the name of the accused creature appear in public print.

Oregon's Population.

RECENT census statistics give some interesting facts in reference to the population of this state. In the month of June, 1880, the population was 174,776, of whom 144,273 are native and 30,503 foreign born. Of the native born, there were born in Oregon 66,033; Missouri, 10,735; Illinois, 7,803; Iowa, 6,969; Ohio, 6,129; California, 5,951; New York, 5,434; Indiana, 5,054; Pennsylvania, 3,377; Kentucky, 2,746; all other natives, 21,863. There are 2,122 colored people in the state, 1,889 of whom were born in Oregon. Of the foreign born there were born in China 9,472; German Empire, 5,034; Ireland, 3,659; England, 1,896; Canada, 2,371; Scotland, 1,129; Sweden, 983; Switzerland, 730; Norway, 574; France, 576; all other foreign born, 3,141.

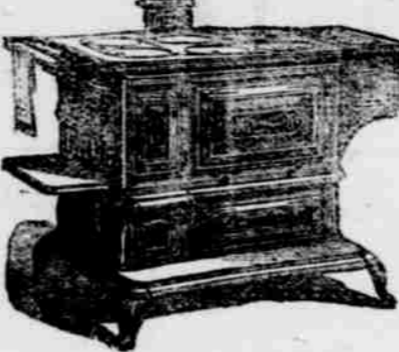

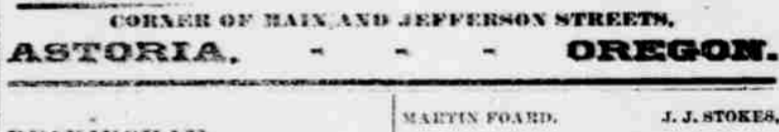
