THE CITY.

Flags and arches are going up in abundance. Squemoqua street looks gay. Rev. R. S. Stubbs will preach at the Methodist church at 11 o'clock a. m. Sunday school at noon.

Rev. J. T. McCormack will hold divine service at the uptown school-house at 6 o'clock this evening. The tug Pioneer cleared from Philadelphia last Tuesday. She will be here about the 15th of September.

From the Oregonian we learn that Beaver Lodge, of this place, has sent \$148 as a donation for the Orphan's Home. Bishop Morris, assisted by Rev. Dr. Nevins, will officiate in Grace church, Astoria, to-day, July 2d, morning and evening, at the usual hours.

There will be the regular meeting of the Y. M. C. A., at their rooms at a quarter to three this afternoon. Every one that comes will be heartily welcomed.

The German Evangelical Reform congregation of Astoria, now organized, will have divine service to-day at 2 p. m., at the Baptist church. John Gantenbein pastor.

The roadway is in temporary condition for travel. O'Brien and others went to work yesterday and put it in as good a fix as they could until it is placed in permanent order.

The 29 young ladies who are to represent the several states in Tuesday's parade will please assemble at Mrs. E. S. Warren's at ten o'clock on the morning of the Fourth.

Henry Martin a fisherman of the Fisherman's Packing Company was accidentally shot yesterday at upper town. The ball has been extracted and the man is now doing well at St. Mary's Hospital.

A fisherman whose name we could not learn fell yesterday from the wharf at the lower part of the city to the rocks below; receiving severe bruises on the side and chest. He was taken to the Hospital.

Rev. R. A. Griswell will preach in the Presbyterian church at 11 a. m., and in connection with the service the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be administered. Sunday school at noon. No evening service, that all may have an opportunity to attend the Bethel service in the M. E. church.

We are in receipt of the California for July. It has some fine articles in it and is worth reading. A Long Branch train went pinging through a Shrewsbury river bridge on the New Jersey Central railroad and killed twenty people last Friday evening; eighty others are seriously wounded. Several prominent men were badly hurt. General Grant escaped with slight bruises. Economy in the use of safety rails was the cause.

Council Proceedings.

An adjourned council meeting was held last Friday night. A petition from property owners along the line of Cedar street, from West-sixth to Salmon street, asking the same to be repaired by sheathing over with three-inch planks, was read, and on motion, referred to the committee on streets and public ways.

The report from the committee on streets and public ways, on the petition asking council to cause West-sixth street to be improved from the north side of Wall street to the south side of Berry street, was read, and on motion referred.

An ordinance providing for painting the City Hall and Bell tower, was read, and under suspension of rules, was passed. An ordinance providing for constructing and laying sewers in certain portions of Cass, Main, Benton, Lafayette, Washington and Jackson streets, was read and referred to committee on streets and public ways.

It was ordered that the auditor and clerk give notice by publication, that ordinance No. 448, concerning firing fire crackers within certain limits of the city, was still in force. (The ordinance appears in this morning's issue.) An ordinance appropriating \$250 out of the general fund for the payment of the city assessor for services for the year 1882 as such assessor, and authorizing the drawing of a warrant therefor, was passed under suspension of the rules. The claim of E. C. Holden for \$250 was ordered paid; the claim of Daniel Whipple for \$54.34 was referred to the committee on health and police. The claim of E. R. Haves for \$7.75 was referred to committee on fire and water.

RESOLUTIONS. Councilman Taylor offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the auditor and clerk be and he is hereby directed to give ten days' notice in THE DAILY ASTORIAN that the common council propose to improve and repair that portion of Cedar street, lying between the east side of West sixth street, and the west line of Salmon street, by sheathing the same with planks three inches in thickness, and by repairing the railing and piling wherever out of repair.

Councilman Gray offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the Auditor and clerk be instructed to give notice by publication in THE DAILY ASTORIAN that the common council propose to improve and repair Salmon or East-second street, in Shively's Astoria, from the south line of Cedar street to the north line of Henlock street, by sheathing said Salmon or East-second street with three-inch planking, and by repairing the piling wherever out of repair.

It was also resolved that notice be given of intention to repair Henlock street between the east line of East-second and the east line of Henlock street in the same manner as the preceding. On motion, the matter of letting property owners repair the roadway to upper Astoria temporarily until such time as the council could order the same repaired, was referred to committee on streets and public ways. On motion council adjourned.

At a meeting of the Fire-delegates last evening, C. H. Stockton, B. S. Worsley and A. A. Cleveland were appointed from Rescue No. 2; B. F. Stevens, Joe Charters and E. A. Fisher from Astoria No. 1, to the state convention of firemen to be held in Astoria on the 5th inst. The following were elected members of Engine Co. No. 1: Martin Olson, Thos. Shumbly, Jas. Smith, Thos. Bridwell, and J. F. Halloran.
