—Almost cool enough for a fire.

—A refreshing shower of rain yesterday morning.

—There are two circuses heading up this way, and are liable to break out any day.

—The Columbia is due this morning from San Francisco.

The State of California will be down at 9 a. m.

—There were 11,338 votes cast in the 4th judicial district, at the election on June 5th.

J. F. Caples' majority was 2,910.

—The Idaho was to leave Portland at three o'clock yesterday afternoon.

She will probably get away from here this morning, for the Sound.

—At the open temperance meeting held in this city on the fourth inst., a series of congratulatory resolutions were passed in reference to the recent prohibition victory in Iowa.

—The Edwin Reed has finished loading. She has 38,000 cases of salmon aboard.

The Wallacetown took on 3,038 cases yesterday, making a total of 21,493 now aboard.

—The Clara Parker will leave her dock at 5 o'clock this morning with freight and passengers for Portland.

Returning, she will leave Portland at eight o'clock next Tuesday for Ilwaco, direct.

—About \$75 has been raised to procure a suitable testimonial for Jas. Kiernan, of the Portland fire department, for his gallant rescue of Capt. Howes' boy, on the afternoon of the Fourth.

—Wm. Howe, late of this city, writes from Victoria to say that if there is any one here to whom he is indebted, they can get their money by making out a bill and taking it to H. B. Parker, with whom he has left a sum of money for that purpose.

—The Mountain Queen came down yesterday as the regular Portland packet.

There is a marked improvement in the traveling facilities to and from Portland this season.

Perhaps if there were another Fleetwood we would have a noon boat every day; but it is not so bad as it is.

—The Canby will make two trips to-day, leaving Gray's wharf at her regular time—8 o'clock in the morning—and again at half past two this afternoon, for Ilwaco.

This will be a great accommodation to excursionists and visitors. It is the intention of the I. S. N. Co., to make two trips a day on Wednesdays and Saturdays till further notice.

—It is announced that a Wisconsin firm has just closed a contract for a patent process for the manufacture of whisky from the smoke of burning wood, and a \$25,000 plant is being laid down for the distillery at Bernwood, in Shawano county.

It is claimed that six gallons of whisky can be obtained from one cord of wood. If some of our lumber men here can get the royalty for the Columbia river they can make money out of it.

The Rive King Performance.

An Astoria Invention.

The Devonshire.

The 2338 ton steamer Devonshire, arrived in yesterday afternoon, twenty-four days from Hongkong.

The captain reports a voyage devoid of any remarkable incident; there was one death on board from dysentery.

The vessel and crew are as clean as it is possible to be under the circumstances.

There are 846 Chinese aboard. The Devonshire is owned by the Marshalls, of London, the same firm that owned the Buckinghamshire, which went ashore below here some years ago.

She is the first of the sea tramps that came to the Columbia without danger of incurring a fine, as she does not carry any more passengers than her tonnage entitles her to.

Coming to the Seaside.

James A. Lawrence, the polygamist, who has been ruing the folly of his ways in the Portland jail for several months, will be removed to Astoria next week to remain till the opening of the circuit court here on August 1st.

Coroner's Inquest.

CATHLAMET, W. T., July 6, 1882.

We, the jury summoned to inquire into the cause of the death of an unknown man found in the Columbia river, near Skamokawa, W. T., July 6, 1882.

Said body was very much decomposed; had been in the water fully three months; six feet in height; supposed to be about fifty years of age; had on two pair of drawers—under pair red, upper pair blue; brown ducking overalls, dark blue shirt; in the pockets were an empty buckskin purse, \$4.75 in silver, one pocket handkerchief, a three-bladed pocket-knife (horn handle), also some grains of wheat. He is supposed to have been a longshoreman or stevedore.

Had on one sturdy shoe, No. 9, and a good sound set of teeth.

We, the jury, after close examination, have come to the conclusion that said man came to his death by drowning.
