In the senate last Friday the amendments to the river and harbor bill proposed by senator Slater and Grover, increasing appropriations for the Cascade locks from \$265,000 to \$300,000, and adding \$25,000 to the appropriation for the lower Willamette and Columbia rivers, passed. It is possible that the \$25,000 additional appropriated "for the lower Willamette and Columbia," was in the form of an amendatory proposition, making it a special appropriation for the improvement of the bar; but it is by no means probable.

The official count of the vote at the election held in this state on the 5th ult., shows that there were 41,669 votes cast. We have summarized the several majorities before; our figures varied very little from the official declaration. George's majority is 3,365; Earhart's, 2,516; Hirsch's, 2,652; McElroy's, 5,223; the reason for Prof. McElroy's large majority is that 2,180 Democratic votes were cast for "C. L. Worthington," and 1,940 for "W. L. Worthington;" Byer's majority was 2,438; Lord's, 1,401.

The payment of \$100,000,000 in pensions during the present fiscal year has seemed an immense burden, but it is said the payment will be \$50,000,000 greater next year, \$100,000,000 the following year, and \$75,000,000 the year after that. The annual appropriation for pensions should then be not more than \$50,000,000, although that sum will seem large to pay at the end of nearly a quarter of a century from the war. The payment of pensions to disabled soldiers and sailors is most cheerfully made, but the knowledge that a large per cent of the pension money goes into the hands of persons whose names have found a place on the pension list through fraud, excites the just indignation of many people.

A SAN FRANCISCO despatch of the 7th, says: Under good crop prospects here and the threatening war cloud in Europe, which has given stronger tones to the wheat market there, rates have shown some improvement, and wooden ships are firmly held at \$2 10s direct. Figures closely approximating the rates are said to be obtainable, but at this writing no engagements are reported. Tonnage bound here is increasing slowly, as well as the amount in port. The first new wheat arrived yesterday, but it will be fully a month before active export business in grain can be looked for.

The Chicago board of education advertised for 125 canvassers for the school census. Five hundred able-bodied men, who knew how to read and write and figure, clamorous for a three weeks' job, appeared in response. In other words, 500 educated men were out of a job and glad to get the most temporary employment for one vacancy there were four applicants. The Free Press thinks this is a striking commentary upon the usefulness of the education which is dispensed to the school children these men are hired to enumerate.

During the debate in congress over the bill appropriating \$80,000 additional funds for the Arafallo, Cheyenne and other Indians, it was shown that the rations furnished these Indians are better and in fuller quantities than the food usually enjoyed by the laboring masses of the country. They are given three pounds of beef per day, also bacon, sugar rice, flour and coffee.

GENERAL SKOBELOFF, the Russian commander, whose indiscreet utterances at Paris last winter excited the ire of the German press, died at Moscow, last Friday, of heart disease.

JAS. RUSSELL LOWELL, American minister to England, says he will not resign. Jas. is sensible: \$17,400 a year is a good deal more than writing poetry would furnish. But he should remember that naturalized American citizens are to be protected, and 'tis for that he is paid.

SOLOM CHASE'S advice is "stay east young man." So between him and Horace Greeley the young man will be likely to locate somewhere in the vicinity of Ohio.

THE Garfield memorial association has held a meeting in Chicago, and reported \$120,000 in the fund.

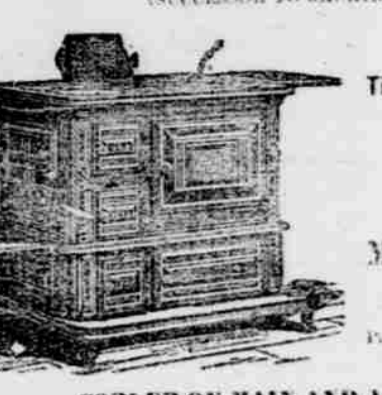
