Johnson, the owner. His sail loft in
the upper part is one of the completest
institutions of the kind on the coast.

A leading canneryman from up-
river, says that the canneries above
Tongue Point are all behind; but that
the Astoria canneries are about up to
last season's pack. We have ceased
having any opinion about it some-
time ago.

Passengers on the Columbia
yesterday morning were profuse in
their compliments regarding our fine
weather. In contrast with the stifling
heat of the interior they thought that
our sea breeze and delightful cool air
was something for which we should
be envied.

The managing committee were
around yesterday paying bills incurred on
the Fourth. They expended the
money entrusted to them with judg-
ment, and will probably come out even.
A detailed statement of the
receipts and expenditures will be pub-
lished in a few days.

How long will it be before our
warehousemen will have to balk at
the water front? There's constant
filling in going on, and in some places a
noticeable shoaling of the water.
The absence of the teredo makes it
comparatively cheap; and its a job
