REMNISCENCES OF '48

The discovery of gold in California in 1848 gave rise to the greatest excitement in the United States of any event since the declaration of independence. The first news of the discovery reached Oregon by the arrival in Portland of the captain of a ship from San Francisco, bringing with him, and exhibiting to the eager gaze of the astonished citizens, a sample of the shining dust with the assurance that there was an abundance for all that would go and dig it out. In 24 hours men had saddled their cayuses and taken the trail to California, 600 miles distant. Two days later, as the writer of this was at work building a stone chimney for a man on the Rieckel in Polk county, a party of 6 men with 12 horses packed with provisions, 6 of them carrying each a pick and shovel on top of their pack, came up the road on a gallop. This was a strange apparition to the quiet people of the valley. Men ran out of their houses and from the fields swinging their hats to attract their attention and demanding the news; one of the party would stop up, while the rest dashed on without a halt, answered "gold discovered on American river in California and no mistake; plenty for everybody." The effect was electrical, probably not a man who heard it could continue his work through the day. Teams were unhitched from the plough, wagons were left standing in the road, schoolmasters dismissed schools on the instant, leaving the little urchins wondering if they were crazy. Men were riding all night to find their horses, some patching up old pack saddles, others shoeing a saddle horse, every old cast off horse shoe in the neighborhood was in requisition in an instant. It was no use taking a horse to a blacksmith, he was getting ready to go, or was already gone. The doctor on the way to visit a sick patient, hearing the news turned round and rode home quicker than he came. Next morning a board leaning against the door, or the fence, with "not at home" in chalk, or coal, told the story there was no physician there. The lawyer left his case in court to take care of itself, and the court left for California. The minister on his way to his appointment met the news and the next night found him in camp on the trail 40 miles nearer the mines. The effect on prices was instantaneous. A shovel and pick worth \$3 went up to \$10 and \$12, and even \$22, at a single jump, even a garden hoe sold as high as \$7. Horses went up 100 per cent and tin pans to two and a half. Bed cords were stripped from bedsteads and twisted into ropes and a strip of rawhide two inches wide and 6 feet long was worth 60c and before the next harvest flour was up to \$16 per hundred lbs. Some men unable to outfit themselves obtained one by pledging half the proceeds of their labor for a year. Ship masters charged double passage to San Francisco. The old bark Henry left the Columbia with a full cargo of lumber in her hold and a layer of men on top of the lumber. The passengers declared they would go if they had to swim all the way. The ship lost her bulwarks, water casks, deck load and all her boats, but the passengers got there all the same, though just a little wet. The oldest men, with the youngest boys, and the women and girls comprised the sum total of the resident population of Oregon till the next spring. A. MIXER.

Or two or three little houses for the hens with little broods of chicks? Can you bring home a pane of glass and a wad of putty and repair damages in the sitting-room window? Can you hang some cheap paper on the kitchen? Do you know how to fix a pump when it chokes? Can you make two or three tree-boxes for the shade trees you planted on the sidewalk, if you knew how to plant them? Can you do anything about the house that Con Regan can't? My dear boy you see why Nora Mulligan will have none of you; she wants a higher type of true manhood. You expect to hire a man to do all the man's work about the house, but you want your wife to do everything any woman can do. Believe me, my son, nine-tenths of the girls who play the piano and sing so charmingly, who you, in your limited knowledge, set down as "mere

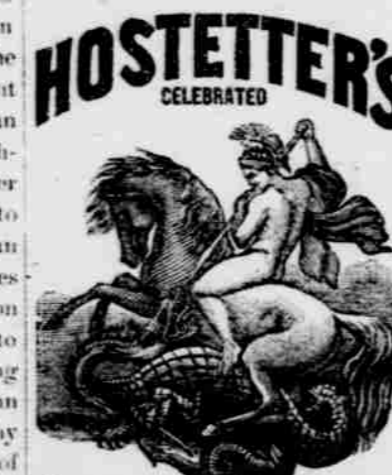
