In an extended and well-written article the Oregonian of the 22d takes the same view of the salmon fishing that was enunciated in THE ASTORIAN of the 19th. On one point we take issue with our contemporary, viz: in the locality of the line below which fishing should be prohibited. In the article in question the Oregonian says:

All that part of the Columbia river below Tanzy point on one side and Smith's point on the other, should be designated by legislative act as open channel way or harbor ground, upon which fishermen should not be allowed to trespass.

As the Oregonian here repeats what it said in reference to this matter in a previous issue, the presumption is that its mistake is due to a lack of geographical knowledge concerning the locality. Tanzy point and Smith's point being both on the Oregon side of the river would render nugatory any such designation as regards legal limits. We think our suggestion, in reference to Sand island is preferable.

A good deal of congratulatory hand-rubbing is going on relative to the notion that should there be a general European war, it will be "a good thing" for this country, as men can't fight without food, and we of the United States, must surely make money by furnishing supplies. In the event of such a state of affairs, the boom would hardly assume any extraordinary proportions on account of our miserable transportation facilities. Were there a war England would make the profit in the carrying trade. Uncle Sam will never make what he might out of European squabbles till he owns his own team to go to market.

"It is almost incredible," says the Buffalo Courier, "that the government can place a two per cent loan at par. If the national credit continues to grow at this rate people may one day expect that the bondholders, instead of receiving, will pay interest for the mere privilege of having the nation for their debtor." And then will come the millennium of mammon—with seven-eighths of the people worse off than slaves and the wealth of the country concentrated in the hands of the other eighth. We are having a fore-taste of this inexorable despotism already, even at three and a half per cent.

The New York Sun thinks that, considering the great strides made in Oregon and Washington Territory, it is not strange that there should be no part of the country in which the inhabitants are more confident of a great future than in this uttermost northwestern corner of the republic.

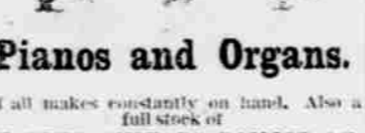

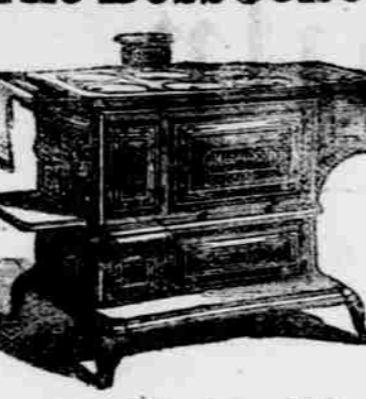
