Congress adjourns to-morrow.

Yesterday's Oregonian contains a clever letter from Tom Merry, who is down here on a flying visit.

Rev. T. W. Walters will give the first of a series of lectures to young men, this evening. Seats free to all.

Yesterday the government engineers began scraping St. Helens bar; the boat used is the Oklahama, the O. R. & N. Co. furnishing the vessel free of expense.

Rev. J. McCormac will conduct divine service in the M. E. church this morning at 11 o'clock. No service in the evening in consequence of the absence of the pastor.

There will be divine service on board the ship Elwell, lying at the O. R. & N. Co.'s dock, at 4 p. m., and in the school house, upper Astoria, at 6 p. m., Rev. J. McCormac officiating.

Matt Anderson and Andrew Solomon were scuffling on the roadway near the half-way saloon, yesterday, when they both fell over on the rocks below. They are both lying in a dangerous condition at St. Mary's Hospital.

F. W. Stechhan went below to the Columbia to engage an opera bouffe company, if practicable, and on his return, if he brings the company, he will stop here first. Mr. Stechhan has leased the Portland theater for a term of five years.

Miss Nellie Sloan, whose name is famous in connection with J. A. Lawrence, now awaiting trial here, was on the Oregon that arrived yesterday afternoon. She didn't stop; it is said her coming has nothing to do with the Lawrence trial, which begins next Tuesday.

The total number of Chinese that came into the Columbia river from Hong Kong, since the 1st of last April up to date, is 9,419; of these, 1,552 came via San Francisco, the rest came direct from China. During the same time 27,438 have arrived at San Francisco.

Under the able supervision of Mr. J. N. Levinson, the present efficient incumbent, the city news of the Oregonian is presented in remarkably good shape. The instinct for information coupled with the ability to embellish the facts in graceful English, is exemplified in the spicy locals, the sentences of which are as distinctively his as his autograph.

In another column will be found the announcement of a dramatic reading by Miss Henrietta Monroe, next Thursday evening. This talented lady has received high encomiums of praise from audiences in this country and England, and will doubtless meet with a cordial reception from those who can appreciate elocutionary art.

**Oregon Short Line**

R. E. Straborn who reached Omaha recently from Wood River and the route of the Oregon Short Line Railway which the Union Pacific is building, gives an Omaha Herald reporter some news about this great enterprise. The main line which starts at Granger Wyoming, 876 miles west of Omaha, on the Union Pacific railway, is in operation from Granger to Cokeville, Idaho, a distance of eighty-five miles, mixed trains being run since Saturday. Some of the largest mines of coaling coal in the country, especially valuable for railways and for smelters in the Wood river country and beyond are developed at Cokeville. Soda Springs, Idaho, is the next important point and lies 149 miles beyond Granger. Track is being laid rapidly and will reach there early in August. Soda Springs promises to lay Manitou and other Colorado resorts in the shade. It possesses the finest group of mineral springs in America, and is situated in a beautiful spot in Bear river valley, surrounded by high mountain ranges. The mountains are full of large game, deer and sheep and trout abound in the streams. It is an old volcanic region, and some extinct geyser cones and craters are still in a good state of preservation. To Port Neuf canon the line is being graded from Soda Springs. The canon is one of the most picturesque in the west and the river abounds in falls and cascades. Passing through the canon the railway is being built to Port Neuf station, where it joins the Utah and Northern railway track. The line through to Port Neuf will be opened this fall. In the meantime construction is going on rapidly west from the Utah & Northern toward Wood river and Boise City. On this line about forty-five miles of track have been laid, carrying it across Snake river where the bridge is built above American Falls, affording a magnificent view. At present the track is being laid beyond the river at the rate of a mile and a half a day. About five thousand men and several thousand teams, are working on the Oregon line, engaged mainly in grading west of Snake river. They will endeavor to reach Wood river crossing, eighty miles west of Snake river, early in September. From Wood crossing the constructors propose building the Wood river branch northward, into the heart of the Wood river country, to Bellevue and Hailey, which it is intended to reach also this fall. At the juncture a town has been laid out called Shoshone, fourteen miles from Shoshone Falls, which are twice the size of Niagara, and next to Niagara the grandest spectacle of a cataract in America. It is expected to make Shoshone an important point for the supply of a rich agricultural and stock region besides being the point of departure for tourists to Shoshone Falls. The Wood river branch runs through a valley much of which is as rich as any of the best of the Rocky Mountain Valleys, and at Bellevue and Hailey it reaches the heart of a rich mining region, while the completion of the road will afford a rail outlet to transport thousands of tons of ore that are being piled up in anticipation of its coming. With a fair winter it is believed that the main line of the Oregon road can be finished to Baker City within a year.

**Yesterday's Sale**

The sale of lots at auction at Alderbrook, by E. C. Holden, yesterday, was largely attended and the bidding was spirited. One entire block situated on the flat and 350 feet south of the stage road was sold, lot by lot, at prices varying from 130 to 180 dollars a lot, the whole block realizing \$1,827.50. Twenty side lots were sold to almost as many different buyers, which is a sure guarantee that Alderbrook will soon be settled and become a thriving suburb of Astoria.

The Y. M. C. A. will have their regular meeting at a quarter to three this afternoon.

The Columbia went to sea at two o'clock yesterday afternoon, and the Oregon came in at eight in the evening.

The Shubrick was rushing up and down the stream yesterday, engaged, so we are informed, in buoying the new channel above Tongue point. After reading about those English vessels that are banging away in the Mediterranean it always affords us relief to see that gallant vessel, and realize that she is a part of our American navy.

**A Portland View of It**

We never run to a fight, nor from it, but as the Sunday Muckery sees it to blame, as any one does when cut by a whip, we publish the following, received last evening from a Portland fireman, whose love for fair play impels him to state the case anew.

PORTLAND OREGON, Aug. 4, 1882.

**EDITOR ASTORIAN:**  
 I should not have intruded upon your space but for the scurrilous article appearing in the last issue of the Sunday Mercury—our hostility paper—in relation to Columbian (alias the Owl) No. 3's resolution of thanks extended to the Astoria Fire Department for a generous reception on the Fourth. The outrageous insinuation of this article, together with the damnable ingratitude manifested by a few members of No. 3, creates a desire to say a few words in relation to this not unforeseen denunciation.

In the first place the Astorian boys have to learn, if they have not already learned, that the personnel of a metropolitan volunteer fire department is of quite a different cast to that of a suburban or country village. In the cities the fire companies are composed of the worst and most desperate classes. Their rosters bear the names of tramps, loafers, beer-guzzlers and confirmed hoodlums, who find in the fire company an institution admirably adapted to their wants and temperaments. In the engine house they have a safe and congenial rendezvous, where they may will themselves drunk with beer, smoke opium and insult the lady-passers with perfect impunity. A fire, to the metropolitan volunteer, is the grand occasion for increasing his stock of worldly assets. He is not consumed with the worthy ambition of mastering the fire-fund. The laurel wreath is won in getting "first water," and his energies henceforth exerted in bearing off the spoils. To this species of firemen an alarm is an occasion for throwing water—anywhere, everywhere, and if nowhere else, on the non-combustible citizens. He is characterized with an inflexible determination to ruin with water all that the fire does not consume or his craft and cunning fails to make way with. To him the awarding of "first water" is far more vital than the existence of whole rows of buildings. Oftener the spanner and nozzle plays an important part in deciding the momentous question while the fire leaps and laughs in their angry faces. But the time of all times dear to the heart of a metropolitan fireman is election time. Then it is that he swells in free beer, free lunches and ready money. Then it is he makes his hereditary foe—the tax-paying citizen feel the pitiable insignificance of his influence in the civic economy. For our firemen votes—votes with a persistency that brings substantial recognition at the hands of Hon. J. H. Wirepiller or Judge F. B. Loggroller. Who would not be a metropolitan fireman escape poll and road taxes with other immunities! The inducements are irresistible, and Portland suffers to-day under its greatest evil—a volunteer fire department!

The mistake the Astoria boys made was in not reckoning their guest. They forgot who they were to entertain—not gentlemen nor gentlemen's sons, but the riffraff from the streets of a city, on whose vitiated and depraved tastes the simple and manly exercises of a country fete-day fell flat and insipid. They should have provided entertainment worthy of their guest. Particularly the worthy trio who seem to be so outraged and scandalized by the resolution in question. Had Astoria brought forward a five gallon keg of beer and placed a salmon can in the hand of each of her three distinguished visitors, she would have escaped the scathing rebuke at their hands, and would not to-day be languishing under the stigma of inhospitality. Why, they did not even have an opportunity to make themselves conspicuous, and were so shamefully ignored as not to have been invited down to Hill's to witness a special prepared piece of rich and racy scenes. They might, at least, have been presented with a gold watch, apiece, but no, not even that humble honor to their royal august presence—Horatio W. Cushing, Esq., Ex-Ass. engineer; Hon. Chas. Christie, commissioner, and John Kirney, foreman. And every Bridget's son of them failed to receive "decent treatment" at the hands of the Astoria boys.

**Raising Judge Stott's Salary**

On Thursday afternoon, after the adjournment of court and after Judge Stott had gone home, an informal meeting of members of the bar was held at the court house, where the following position was agreed upon and is being circulated and generally signed by members of the bar:

To the Honorable the Senators and Representatives of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon—The undersigned members of the bar and practicing attorneys of the fourth judicial district of the state of Oregon, respectfully call your attention to the inadequacy of the compensation provided by law for the judge of the circuit court of the aforesaid district, and urge upon your honorable body the necessity of increasing his compensation. The present compensation (\$2,000 per annum) is barely a living at most, and if increased to \$3,000 per annum, would then be but a moderate allowance to an officer whose position requires competency and ability, added to great and constant labor. We therefore petition your honorable bodies to pass a law fixing the salary of the judge of the said fourth judicial district at thirty-six hundred dollars. And as in duty bound your petitioners will ever pray, etc.
