The Seattle Herald goes after

was here about six weeks ago.

The Cordelia will discharge 275
tons of coal at Gray's dock; the John
O'Gaunt puts off 500 tons at Flavel's
dock.

J. P. Young, of the San Fran-
cisco Chronicle, is on a voyage of ob-
servation and went up on the Colum-
bia yesterday.

The catching of tomcod and
smelt affords daily amusement and
employment to boys, young and old,
along the wharves.

The newly-arrived rector of Grace
church, Rev. M. D. Wilson, will be
tendered a reception at the residence
of Capt. M. M. Gilman, this even-
ing.

The British bark Cordelia, Baron
master, arrived in yesterday, 58 days
from New Castle, N. S. W., with 800
tons of coal consigned to Ralston,
Guthrie & Co.

Every mechanic in Astoria is
busy; carpenters have orders ahead,
the main trouble with them being to
get lumber in sufficient quantities to
finish their contracts on time.

The report that a genuine case of
Asiatic cholera has been developed in
a little inland town of Michigan, oc-
casions grave fears that the dreadful
 scourge may spread along every line
of travel.

A case of domestic scandal was
under discussion at a tea-table. "Well,
let us think the best of her we can,"
said an elderly spinster. "Yes," said
another, "and say the worst—that's
the fashion."

It has been decided by the ladies
of the Presbyterian church to have an
entertainment on Thursday and Fri-
day evenings of next week; the pro-
gramme, which is an attractive one,
will be announced in due time.

Capt. Hiram Brown expected to be
able to celebrate the thirty-second
anniversary of his arrival in Astoria
by the completion of his wharf on the
1st inst., but the delay in supplying
piles has put his men back several
weeks.

It has been unanimously decided
by a Second Adventist congregation at
Phillipsburg, Indiana, that the world
will "come to an end" on the 4th of
next month. All right; we can all get
along just as well without it. It always
was a confounded bother.

The war between the boarding
house runners, though not of such di-
mensions as the Egyptian war, is as
fiercely waged; yesterday, upon the
arrival of the Cordelia, one of them,
named Lloyd, started to "put a head"
on Wincent, and make it otherwise
unpleasant for that individual. It
seems to us that it would be a good

boarding a vessel until the custom

A Quick Passage.

The British bark John O'Gaunt
which anchored here the day before
yesterday morning, left Sydney July
15th, thus making the passage in 51
days. This we believe, the quickest run
yet made by any sailing vessel between
Australia and Astoria. Captain
Powells gives a good account of the
voyage and says he came up through
the islands sighting several of them.
He hopes for a short time off the
islands of Raratonga and Humphey,
but none of the inhabitants seemed
inclined to communicate. From the
abstract of the log of the John O'Gaunt
she must be a fast sailer, as we see 310
knots secured for one day's run. She
belongs to Messrs. James Beagley &
Sons, of Liverpool, and we presume
will load grain for that port.

99,271 bushels of wheat. Of this
amount 82,300 bushels were trans-
ferred from a Locust Point elevator
on board the ship in four hours. The
actual working time in loading and
stowing away the entire cargo was
eleven hours.—Bulletin.
