The steamer Yaquina sails to-day
for Victoria and Puget Sound ports.
The State is due this morning
from San Francisco; the Oregon from
Portland.

The British ship Don Enrique,
McAllister master, arrived in Tuesday
evening from Hilo.

The Wayatchie is taking off some
of the cargo of the Astoria, which is
lying at the upper dock.

We are informed that Miss
Katie Flavel will sing at the Presby-
terian festival this evening.

Parties from the Nehalem report
seeing bear tracks and are confident
of catching two for front-door pets.

The Cordelia and John O'Gaunt
finished discharging coal yesterday
morning and were towed up stream.

The Hoquiam Mill company, on
Gray's Harbor, is having a large ad-
dition built to the mill. It is doing
an extensive business.

The ladies entertainment at Lib-
erty hall begins this evening. Ice
cream and other refreshments will be
furnished those who attend.

From the Oregonian we learn
that H. L. Pike and A. W. Ferguson,
of this city, have been granted a pa-
tent for a hydraulic dredger.

The sale that E. C. Holden ad-
vertises to-morrow attracts consid-
erable attention. It is a valuable
property and will be a good invest-
ment.

The cannery at Wiskah, at the
mouth of the Chehalis river, began
work on the 1st inst. On the first
night the boats came in loaded with
hundreds of silver salmon.

In the legislature, last Tuesday,
the house and senate met in joint
convention and went through the
form of declaring Z. F. Moody duly
elected governor of Oregon.

Col. Wood, of Neah Bay, has
charge of the agency at Neah Bay,
where there are seventeen hundred
Indians under his immediate care.
They migrate from Columbia river to
the straits.

At sundown yesterday began the
Jewish New Year; the first of Tishree,
5643; in accordance with universal
custom the stores and places of busi-
ness of our Jewish fellow citizens will
be closed to-day.

Parties desirous of having their
children attend the select school at
Grace church, will find Mr. Wilson,
the rector, at the school room this
morning from nine to twelve. The
school begins next Monday.

A railroad to Astoria would do
Salem more present good than any
other enterprise.—Touca Talk.

The Astoria land grant could not
stand any such enterprise as that. It
would play the deuce with its "re-
served" rights.

Andrew Anderson, who had
been ill of typhoid fever for eight
days, died yesterday afternoon. He
was a steady, industrious young man
and is deeply mourned. The funeral
will take place at the Methodist church
at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

An expedition has gone into the
Olympic or Coast range of mountains,
W. T., commanded by Colonel Cham-
bers. Its route will be via Port Dis-
covery bay. One endeavor will be to
find the headwaters of the Douglas
river, and another to find an immense
plateau said to be situated somewhere
in that region, and which has never
been trodden by the foot of a white
man. Thirty or forty men comprise
the party.

Wedding Bells.

The wedding of Mr. C. H. Martin
and Miss Florence E. Brown was sol-
emnized at eight o'clock last evening
at the residence of J. W. Gresham,
Rev. J. V. Milligan officiating. The
house, which was very tastefully de-
corated for the occasion, was filled with
a large number of invited guests.
After the ceremony a splendid sup-
per was served, to which all present
did justice. Miss Brown has made
hosts of friends during her year's resi-
dence in Astoria, who will unite in
wishing her abundant happiness in her
new home. Mr. Martin is assistant
superintendent of the Nevada state
insane asylum. As the newly mar-
ried couple stood under the floral
bell last evening receiving the con-
gratulations of their friends, they
presented a handsome appearance.
They leave for their home in Reno,
Nevada, on this morning's steamer.

The Reason Why.

The only reason why steamers are
not running between this city and
Portland, is because the channel of
the river has shifted the past few
months, just above Fairfield and now
runs close to the bank, on the Marion
county side of the river. This part of
the river is filled with fallen trees that
went down in the storm of January
1880, and have never been taken out.
The railroad line of steamers have
no special reason for having the ob-
struction removed, as the freight and
passengers that they would carry
from Salem and above now goes by
railroad to Portland.—Salem Town

Council Proceedings.

The council met in regular session
last Tuesday evening. A petition
from the I. X. L. Packing company
asking permission to build a wharf on
lots 1, 2, 11, 12, and east 1/2 of lots
3, and 10, block 145 in Shively's
Astoria, together with report of com-
mittee on wharves and water front-
age was read, and on motion, adopted.

REMONSTRANCES.

From property owners along the line
of Court street, against the improve-
ment of said street, were received and
filed. A remonstrance from property
owners along the line of Wall street,
remonstrating against the improve-
ment of said street, was referred to
committee on streets.

REPORTS.

Report of committee on health and
police on police judge's report for
July, '82, was received and filed. Re-
port of committee on rules and regu-
lations, in the matter of the printed
city charters and ordinances was read,
and on motion, received and filed, and
recommendation adopted.

The reports of street commissioner,
city sexton, and police judge, for the
month of August, '82, were received
and filed. The city attorney's re-
port in regard to extending Concomly
street, was received and filed. The
city surveyor's report, estimating cost
of improving Benton street, was re-
ferred to proper committee.

ORDINANCES.

An ordinance to prescribe manner
and extent of wharf to be built by
I. X. L. Packing company, was passed
under suspension of the rules.

CLAIMS.

The following claims were ordered
paid: Jackins & Parka—\$59.55,
Wm. Tarrant \$20, Astoria Iron Works
\$26.72, Thos. Logan \$75. The bal-
ance of the batch was referred.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the auditor and clerk
be authorized to give due and lawful
notice that the city council propose
to improve Main street between 8th
and 9th streets by grading, under the
supervision of the street committee:
passed.

Resolved, That the auditor and
clerk be authorized to give lawful
notice that the city council propose to
close Cedar street from West 6th street
to West 2d or Salmon street; and
Hemlock street to the eastern limit of
the city, unless the same be improved
within thirty days from date: passed.

The auditor and clerk was instructed
to furnish each of the city officers
with a copy of the charter and codified
ordinances, taking a receipt therefor.
Adjourned to Saturday, September
16th 1882.

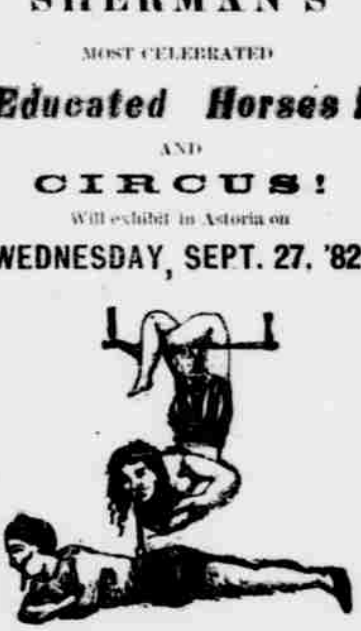
