Profitable Industry.

To the man who possesses the requisite qualities of patience and determination, no part of the United States affords better opportunity to establish a permanent home and to accumulate competence than the northern coast. The resources of the soil, the salubrity of the climate, and the geographical advantages... It is one that will not only be overlong, but is peculiarly suited to the conditions under which we find ourselves, and that will be profitable as any other branch of industry that one can engage in.

Cattle raising for the market on 80, 100 or 200-acre tracts, so profitable, must be the result of what is known as high farming.

There is nothing mysterious in these words. High farming on a stock farm means putting the soil in such condition, by means of drainage and fertilization, as will make it productive to the utmost. It means an intelligent selection of breeding stock, the provision of shelter for the cattle in time of storms, the reserve of a sufficient amount of hay, grain and roots to tide over any unforeseen failure of the pasture field.

To which it may be added, that the utilization of all that the improved farmer allows to go to waste—the blood, the bones, the offal, the slaughtered animals, the refuse of the kitchen, the very chips of the household wood pile, &c., &c., &c., Newell, in his frequent addresses to agricultural societies, public gatherings, &c., &c., is of opinion that the best means of increasing the production of high farming is to increase the amount of light sifted through the soil of the forest tract.

Mr. H. visited a dairy, the pasture field of which embraced 100 acres, sown to timothy and clover, had 65 cows in prime condition throughout the milking season.

These instances might be multiplied indefinitely. We do not, however, need so much to advise our readers of the capacity of our soils as to advise them to turn their attention to their proper utilization, to urge them to begin "high farming," and the raising of fat cattle for market.

Western Washington can discount the sage brush and bunch grass regions east of the mountains in the matter of raising fat and juicy beef, if our people will only take hold of the matter properly. Western Washington ought to raise all its own beef and be an exporter besides.
