OCEAN TELEPHONE

The establishment of telephonic communication between America and Europe still appears as rather a wild project, but it will be an accomplished fact ere long, no one is likely to deny, in view of what has been done with the telegraph. If the sound of the voice can be carried along a wire 300 miles, why should it not be carried along a wire extending 3,000 miles? If there is a loss of strength in the sound proportionate to the distance traveled, then the loudness of the voice must be artificially increased. Nothing more is required, and in a few years we may have the satisfaction of standing in New York and talking confidentially with our friends in London or St. Petersburg. After that will come the teletroscope, which will transmit light as the telephone transmits sound, and thus we shall also be enabled to see from here what is going on at the moment in China or Japan. The Competing Road.

The Oregon Short Line, says a Walla Walla exchange, has but six miles to grade to reach Bellevue, and when the distance to that place is completed, the entire force will be transferred to Burnt river, within thirty miles of Baker. Five hundred Italian graders have already commenced grading in the Burnt river district. The surveys of the O. R. & N. Co., and that of the Oregon Short Line cross each other in several places, and in one place where it is necessary to tunnel, the stakes of the two companies are not three feet apart. This will make close work in running a tunnel. The eastern company will pay no attention to the O. R. & N. Co., but will continue on their way to this city and thence to the Sound, which is their destination. It seems there is to be trouble between the railroads, and it would not surprise us to hear of bloodshed when the Oregon Short Line's Italians and the O. R. & N. Co.'s Chinamen come together.
