**The Meeting To-Night.**

A NOTICE in another column calls for a meeting of the citizens at the court house this evening to discuss certain measures of vital interest to Clatsop county. It is a notorious fact that we of this part of the state have been unjustly treated in the matter of legislative representation. We send one senator jointly with Columbia and Tillamook counties, and one representative, with Tillamook. This should not obtain. The bill now before the legislature gives us no more than what is our just due—one senator, and two representatives. It is to discuss the feasibility of aiding as best we can the passage of this bill that to-night's meeting is called. Let there be a full attendance. But eight days remain of the legislative session. If the bill is defeated by hostile interests this session there is no telling when it can be brought up again, and to continue with our present inadequate representation is an injustice that should not be allowed to continue.

**Democratic Victory.**

THE news from Ohio is more emphatic than surprising. The Buckeye state gave the Democrats a complete victory at last Tuesday's election. The Democratic state committee claim the entire ticket elected by 25,000 majority. Foster explains this defeat in a variety of ways. The only adequate explanation is that he didn't get sufficient votes. Prohibition was the issue that broke the Republicans up. The advocates of temperance made it a direct issue; that aggregation of individual and commercial interests, known as "the liquor interest," met that issue and voted squarely with the Democrats. The German vote, which is usually Republican, was lost to that party for the time. Money was freely used, and though "the temperance vote" greatly increased, yet that fact fails to satisfy the defeated Republican candidates who attribute their defeat to the introduction of that issue into the campaign. In 1881 Ohio gave a Republican majority of 24,309. It seems to be a bad year for the eastern Republicans. Defeat is imminent in the great commonwealths of New York and Pennsylvania, where leading men of that party openly work for opposition candidates, and declare their intention to defeat, if possible, the regular nominees.

THE Washington Territory Democratic convention, which convened at Vancouver last Tuesday, nominated Judge Burke, of Seattle, for congressional delegate; Sam Vinson, of Spokane, for brigadier-general; L. L. Dubeau, of Lewis, for adjutant-general; J. W. Bower of Thurston, for quartermaster-general; W. A. Wash, of Klickitat, for commissary-general; and decided to hold the next convention at Walla Walla.

THAT the returning fishermen do not tell all the big stories, is exemplified by the following from the Seattle Chronicle: "Alex. Henderson, of Douglass, W. T., has fourteen acres in wheat. He has just threshed and measured 954 bushels from this land. Of the fourteen acres there was five that averaged ninety one bushels per acre."

SEATTLE folks believe in a liberal education. When Sherman's circus pranced into that city the other day, the school children were given a holiday to go see the show. Some one must have been well papered.

A SEATTLE dispatch says that the salmon run on the Sound has been unusually light this year. Canning and barreling will cease a fortnight hence.

**"Fine" Writing.**

THE rout of the Egyptian army by Sir Garnet Wolsley's troops gave our esteemed contemporaries over in London a chance for fine writing which they would have been more than human to overlook. The London Times, as usual, led the van, its correspondents vying with its editors in friendly rivalry for the wooden spoon. One of them gave a graphic description of the advance on Tel-el-Kebir, of the English army "stealing on through the dark night" and suddenly appearing "in the bright moonlight" before the astonished foe, which was putting the inconstant moon through her phasings—as one might say—with unparalleled, not to say reckless, celerity. This same correspondent, it may be said, began his despatch with a startling statement of cause and effect. "There was no moon," he wrote, "and thus the two armies were resting peacefully"—a sentence which reminds us of the learned judge's characterization of the prisoner who had enjoyed the advantage of a good education, "instead of which" he had gone about the country stealing ducks. The presence of the moon is known to induce insomnia in dogs, but this is the first time, so far as we are aware, in which a similar phenomenon has been noticed in the case of human beings. Well, "and thus" the Egyptians slept peacefully until the terrible awakening, when they sprang up "to see swiftly advancing upon them from every side an endless line of the dreaded red-coats, broken with the even more fearful blue of the marines." "Fearful blue" is good. The Alexandria correspondent did his little utmost to surpass his confrere at the front by the statement that "during the last two months the Ras-el-Tin palace has been an almost deserted spot, where one could doze uninterruptedly, except for the murmur of many officials struggling hard to master English by the aid of Ollendorf." It is not surprising that after reading these despatches the editorial writer in London should have taken his pen quickly and written that "by rapid pursuit and the use of all means calculated to impress the imagination Fortune was bound to the wheels of Sir Garnet's chariot."

A CORRESPONDENT of the St. Paul Pioneer Press, writing from Astoria, says he is so busy that time slips away without his realizing it. He says: "The days are very short, and the nights a mere nothing." If he will send us his address he will get THE ASTORIAN six months for that remark.

MANAGER CLARK, of the Union Pacific Railroad company, denies the rumor that his company is going to build an Oregon branch to the Columbia river. He says they have an arrangement with the Central Pacific that makes any new line unnecessary for them.
