Arabi Pasha Talks.

THE New York World prints a long letter from its Cairo correspondent dated Cairo September 20, giving an interview with Arabi Pasha, in which the following occurs:

"When I rose to leave, the idea struck me of telling him that I had been corresponding with an American newspaper, and that I should be glad if Arabi would tell me something which I could communicate to the American people, who were the friends of all who were oppressed, and who had shown a great deal of sympathy with the Egyptians during their struggle. 'Why,' said Arabi, 'we are actually making arrangements at the present moment, for a plan of emigration to the United States, and if you think that the Americans will care to hear what my views are, I shall be glad to use your paper as my channel of communication. I have always liked the Americans, who came here disinterestedly, and I number many American officers among my friends.' I promised to repeat faithfully anything he would say on the subject, and I cannot do better than to convey to you the words he himself used, which were as follows:

"The ruin of my country is due to foreigners. They came here against our will, and under the pretense of educating and civilizing us, robbed us and maltreated us. After having obtained a footing in the land by our forbearance, the English, more than others, considered Egypt as their own and the Egyptians as their inferiors and slaves. The great curse, however, of my country has been the Suez Canal. Cursed was the hour in which it was conceived. Cursed was the Sultan that signed its treaty. Cursed was the Khedive that sanctioned it. But above all, cursed be that evil spirit, De Lesseps, who carried it out. If I only had that traitor here in this room for two minutes! But never mind—this is irrelevant. Mohammed Ali Pasha, the founder of modern Egypt, foresaw this trouble, and for that reason never would hear of the canal being built. On the contrary, he was wont to say to those who were importuning him for permission to make it that he did not need a razor with a jeweled handle with which to cut his own throat. The words of the late Kadri Pasha, the Sultan's personal friend, are well known to Orientals. You remember that when the treaty had been signed for the Suez canal by the Sultan, old Kadri said: 'Sire, you are giving the English the key of your door.' Through the canal Egypt has lost millions. For the canal she is millions in debt. The canal gives the powers cause to interfere in our state, and to this very canal do I owe the ruin that has just overtaken my party."

Arabi then proceeded to give a sketch of the immense sums the Egyptians earned from the transportation of travelers and merchandise before the construction of the canal, and bewailed the loss of these revenues. He also gave a sketch of the war, and concluded as follows: "It has been said that Gen. Wolsley has refused to see me, and I authorize you to say it is not true. Without my asking an interview, he has been here twice to see me. You can tell the American people that I thank them for their sympathy with me and with my cause, and that those of us who will escape the executioner will emigrate to their land of freedom, but not as beggars, as the majority of us are well-to-do gentlemen. Abdul Kerim Pasha El Zahar, vice-president of the Cairo university, a great scholar and a wealthy gentleman, knowing English thoroughly, has volunteered to go to America next month at his own expense

and make preparations for the Egyptian emigration. He is well known at all the European courts, and has many friends among learned men in America, who have offered him every encouragement. On receipt of his report many Egyptian families will go to the New World, as if they stay here they will be cruelly persecuted for having asserted their rights; besides which they will have the advantage of studying a government which will be useful to our country in a few years. Neither I nor any of my friends have benefitted our position by the war, which we could easily have done, as everything was at our disposal, and I am proud to say we are poor, and that we have given proofs of the possibility of this country having an honest government without the assistance of British officials."
