Bar and sea moderating. One crossed out at 10 a. m.; W. H. Starbuck in sight, bears S. W. by S., distance 10 miles.

Life boat crew took a pull of fourteen miles yesterday, for a drill. Made landing through the surf at Chinook and hauled off a fishing boat that was on the logs.

The tug Columbia visited the Starbuck this a. m., supplied her with fresh vegetables, etc., and returned with two gentlemen passengers. From one I learn that the ship has had several severe gales on the passage.

In latitude 50 south, experienced terrible weather, Capt. Gift's wife dangerously ill; she died Aug. 18th in lat. 25 south; body aboard now. Night of Oct. 12th experienced a gale in the vicinity of the Lupata disaster. Set foresail, the wind hauled a point and the ship was able to stand clear of the land against strong westerly current. J. C. Cousins crossed on Sunday, 5 p. m. In port, steamers Ona, and Kate and Anna, and tug Columbia.

Oregon Fruit Being Destroyed.

The State Horticultural Society of Oregon met lately, and an address was read on the situation, in which it was said: Among the first acts of the early pioneers that came to Oregon was the planting of orchards. They not only wished to replace the comforts of civilized life which they had left behind them, but well understood what a hold bearing fruit trees would give them in a country so far removed from civilization. The vine and fruit tree ever have been and will be the symbols of contentment and home thrift. These early-planted trees thrive, and, although mostly of inferior varieties, they showed this land well adapted to some of the most important species known to man. But a few years ago the trees and fruits were noted for beauty and freedom from bluish through insect attacks; now these tiny adversaries are but too well known, and their number is legion. Large and valuable parts of the state are already badly infested, and they are rapidly spreading over more territory. Whence came these insects? Most of them were imported on trees, scions and vines, but a large portion came from California, hid in the fruit and in the crevices of boxes, scattering broadcast over the land, sometimes as much to be dreaded in orchards as the yellow fever or small pox would be in your families or homes. The system of fruit-growing as practiced by a large number of your orchardists may be termed the go-as-you-please order, and has produced a chaos from which order can only be restored by the aid of legislation, and such legislation can be obtained, and the object of this meeting is to construct a solid foundation upon which can be organized a united warfare for the extermination of those evils which through negligence have been allowed to spread throughout the orchard and fruit-growing counties. Let it be distinctly understood that no longer will orchard property be allowed to be kept, as it were for the express purpose of propagating insect pests and to spread contagion in the neighborhood where such property is located. Such places should be declared a public nuisance. The shipments of fruit or other transportable material infected by insect pests should no longer be allowed without incurring the penalties of the law.
