A Fine Vessel.

The British steamer Silverton arrived in port October 15th, 21 days from Panama, via Acapulco 16 days. She has just been laying cable off the west coast of South and Central America and Mexico. She is 3,734 tons registered tonnage and was built in 1873 at Newcastle-upon-Tyne and plied between Boston and Liverpool under the name of the Hooper. She was afterwards sold to the India Rubber Gutta Percha Company of London, who remodeled her and changed the name to Silverton. She was chartered from them to lay the cable and left London seven months ago for that purpose. In five months she laid 2,400 miles of cable from Payta, Peru, to the Salinas Cruz, Mexico. She is the first cable steamer that has been in this port. She will go into the drydock, and will afterward probably load wheat for England. The steamer is a beautiful looking craft and splendidly fitted up with cable-laying apparatus. She will probably carry back about 6,000 tons of wheat. While plying between Boston and Liverpool she once carried 8,000 tons of miscellaneous cargo, 7,000 tons of coal, 540 head of cattle and 2,200 sheep.—S. F. Commercial Herald.

When the needed improvements are made to the Columbia river bar, THE ASTORIAN will chronicle the arrival and departure of just such vessels, which will come here to load with Oregon and Washington territory wheat, worth as much afloat at Astoria, as at San Francisco.

The annual report of W. W. Dudley, commissioner of pensions, shows that at the close of the fiscal year ended June 30, 1882, 485,695 pensions had been classified, as follows: Army invalids, 173,138; army widows, minor children, and dependent relatives, 76,448; navy invalids, 2,861; navy widows, minor children, and dependent relatives, 1,953; survivors of the war of 1812, 7,124 and widows of those who served in that war, 26,661. The names of 27,664 new pensioners were added to the rolls during the year, and the names of 649 whose pensions had previously been dropped were restored, making an aggregate increase to the roll of 28,313. The names of 11,446 pensioners were dropped from the rolls for various causes leaving a net increase for the year of 16,867 pensioners. At the close of the year the pension paid to each pensioner aggregated \$102.70, and the aggregate annual value of the whole roll was \$29,341,101.62.

The new comet discovered by Dr. Schmidt, at Athens on the 8th of October, 1882, four degrees southwest of the great comet, with the same motions in right ascension and declination, is reported to be a fragment of the comet which was broken off at its perihelion passage. This proves that the great comet must have grazed a terrible crisis. This is the second instance on record where a comet has been disrupted, the first one being Billeo's comet of 1846.

The New York Tribune makes a center shot, when it says the Republican administration will soon be "an administration without a party." Though prohibition did a good deal toward defeating the election, yet a dislike to Arthur and his coterie did more; and the same causes will produce the same results in the great states of New York and Pennsylvania on the 7th of next month.

A GRANITE MONUMENT has been shipped by the government to Montana to be placed on the spot where fell General Gibbon in his fight with the Nez Percés Indians in 1877.

WATERPROOF, Louisiana, has 177 drinking places, out of 513 houses. The man who named the place was certainly inspired.

The Bey of Tunis has made a treaty with France by which that power assumes the debt of Tunis, organizes an administration of justice and takes charge of all public property, giving the Bey a retiring allowance.

The commissioner of the land office recommends that the pre-emption law be abolished, as the homestead law covers all cases now arising.
