THIRTEEN of the survivors of Col. Stevenson's old command of Mexican war veterans of the First New York Volunteers had a reunion and dinner last Tuesday. A despatch from Col. Stevenson, who is in San Francisco, was received, asking "God's blessing on his old boys." Major Clark gave a brief review of the history of the old regiment. Over two-thirds of its original thousand members, he said, were under twenty-one years of age when they were enrolled, and perhaps that accounted for Wednesday Evening, Nov. 1st the youthful appearance of those assembled around the table. It was considered an arduous undertaking in those days, continued the speaker, to go to California. Gold had-not been discovered and it was an unknown land. Although the regiment did not see much active service, still it had encountered many hardships. Of the original 1000 only 150 were left. Most of the survivors live in California, but about forty had returned to the east. The world had dealt kindly with the most of them, and the survivors represented \$25,000,000 of capital.

A VICTORIA despatch says that miners working in a bank at Cassiar found about thirty Chinese coins strung on a wire six feet below the surface. The wire crumbled to pieces on exposure to the air. 


