A fair and entertainment will be given by the Parish Aid society of Grace church on or about Dec. 12th.

It is said that Hon. Rufus Mallory's recent trip around the world occupied only seventy days in actual travel.

Mark Thall, the live theatrical manager, is in town, in the interest of his latest attraction, the "Humpty Dumpty" troupe, which will appear here on the 27th and 28th.

Members of Beaver Lodge No. 35, I. O. O. F., will meet at their lodge room at 1:30 p. m., Tuesday the 14th inst., to attend the funeral of deceased brother, P. J. Ferchen.

By order N. G. P. J. Ferchen, who has been ailing for a long time with consumption, died at the hospital last Sunday. He was a well-known resident of this place. Deceased was in the thirty-third year of his age. The funeral will take place this afternoon.

The steamer Sam will leave for Skipanon landing at 10 o'clock this morning. E. C. Holden will go down on her to arrange the auction sale of the cows, sheep, etc., at Mulkey's farm to-morrow. On to-morrow the Sam will leave here at 7:30 a. m.

In Pacific county the entire Republican ticket was elected, with the exception of Treasurer—F. C. Davis having been elected to that position. To Mr. John Davis, the efficient county auditor, we are indebted for the election returns which we publish in full this morning.

The captain of the Oregon reports that when he was outside the heads, on his way up, he saw a tug to the southward, which he is certain was the Pioneer, putting into San Francisco. Nothing has yet been heard from the Neb, in search of which vessel the Pioneer started last week.

We have received from C. Brown, a copy of the fourteenth annual list of the merchant vessels of the United States with the official numbers. It contains also full particulars of the navy, revenue marine, light-house board and coast survey vessels. This work has been greatly improved each year, and is now a most valuable work of reference to all interested in maritime affairs.

The Stonewall Jackson is loaded and in the stream; the Helicon is discharging at the dock; the Carrie Delap is loading; the Miles arrived in from Tillamook with a load of salmon last Sunday night; the Oregon arrived in yesterday in place of the State of California. When that steamer was taken off the deck a crack was found in the hub of the propeller and a flaw in the shaft; this last will probably necessitate the casting of a new shaft, and will detain that vessel for some time.

The New York Herald says: "It is said that adding up all the charges, that a vessel of one thousand tons entering and clearing from the port of New York, must pay nearly \$800. This sum is exacted under the form of law. First of all there is pilotage—off shore and in shore. Then there is towage; next comes quarantine inspection, and then the customhouse-boarding officer. "Wharfage" follows. The harbor-master next appears on deck; and when he has been satisfied, the port-warden presents his bill. These are only a portion of the tolls of incoming vessels. When they anchor loose from the dock or weigh anchor, the second visitation of the legislative harpies begins. There is no port in the world where shipping is so outrageously taxed.

Being a stranger in this city, and likely to stop here for some time to come, I ask, you if there is no law or protection, or a law permitting a person to carry a weapon to defend themselves against such a set of shanghaier and sealwags as infest that portion of your city nearest the "Colombia bar."

Sec. 11, Ordinance 413, makes it permissible on the part of the chief of police to cause to be issued to any applicant who complies with the necessary conditions, a permit to carry any weapon of defense that he may deem necessary.

Concealed Weapons

The following will be a law in this state after the 1st of next February:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed about his person in any manner whatever any revolver, pistol or other firearm, or any knife, other than an ordinary pocket knife, or any dirk or dagger, slungshot or metal knuckles, or any instrument by the use of which injury could be inflicted upon the person or property of any other person.

Sec. 2. Any persons violating any of the provisions of section 1 of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than one hundred days, or by both fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this act shall be construed to apply to any sheriff, constable, police or other peace officer, whose duty it is to serve process or make arrests.

Sec. 4. Justices of the peace shall have concurrent jurisdiction to try any person charged with violation of any of the provisions of this act.
