INSPECTOR HOLCOMB, in his report to the general land office, gives an interesting account of the establishment of the land office at Huron, Dakota. October 9th, Monday, was set for the office to open, and at 3 o'clock that morning over 500 attorneys assembled in front of the office in order to be ready for business at 9 o'clock when the doors opened. Then there was such a rush that the doors and windows were broken and several fights occurred in their eagerness to file applications first. The receiver was compelled to make the announcement that all applications would be regarded as having been filed simultaneously. Nine thousand dollars worth of land was sold for cash the first day. One hundred thousand acres were entered, and that was the largest day's work ever done at any land office in this country.

WITH tear-dimmed eyes, says the Idaho Democrat, and heart bowed down with sorrow we bow to the inevitable. We, in common with five or six other old toughs, have been laboring under a fearful nightmare of delusion. In a word, the free and enlightened people of the territory have decided by a majority of a thousand or twelve hundred that they wish north Idaho annexed to Washington Territory. Mr. Singiser made the campaign on that issue and won. The question has been fairly before the people and earnestly and ably discussed. The final result is overwhelmingly in favor of annexation.

NINE years ago Lincoln county, Nevada, awoke the wind and now it is reaping the whirlwind. Seized upon by a set of vampires whose bloodthirstiness excelled that of Tweed ring in their maddest day, the town of Pioche was "run" by them as a means of private enrichment, and the county saddled with an enormous debt that falls due next January. There is not a dollar in the treasury to meet the demands of the creditors, and the Pioche Record jocularly asks "Why should we not be happy?"

The annual exhibition of the Comstock mines was announced to open on the 12th for two days only. Admittance free. Those who go in, says the Bulletin, will not be the only ones taken in during the year. Now that election is over, an effort will be made to entice a little life into Comstock mining securities, and the opening of certain mines to the public is presumably in that interest.

The defeat of Page, of California, for congress, is a loss to us of Oregon. He was chairman of the committee on commerce, of which George is a member, and always worked in unison with improvement and substantial aid. It was ingratitude in his constituents to defeat him, for he had done more for his district than twenty such legal sprigs as the one elected could hope to compass.

A STATEMENT of the treasury department shows that the annual interest charge is \$1.09 per head for all persons in the United States. In 1865 it was at its highest, being \$4.29 per person. In the following year it was \$4.12; a year later \$3.48, gradually lessening until 1871 it touched \$3 per head. Now it has fallen to \$1.09 and will soon go below that.

The December number of the North American Review is to contain two symposiums, one on the Health of American Women, by Dr. James R. Chadwick, Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Dr. Dio Lewis; and the other on Success on the Stage, by John McCullough, Madame Modjeska, Joseph Jefferson, Lawrence Barrett, Maggie Mitchell and William Warren.

The clerks sent out to the Pacific coast by the Indian office to award Indian supplies have purchased supplies to the weight of 486,872 pounds, costing over \$73,000, being an increase over the last purchase, in weight, of 94,472 pounds. They report that supplies in Washington territory cost ten per cent less than on any other part of the coast.

THE agent of the Flathead Indian agency, Montana, has telegraphed to Washington that nearly 8,000 laborers and camp followers, the advance guard of the Northern Pacific R. R., have arrived at the reservation, and asks military assistance to keep the storekeepers from selling whisky to the Indians.

JOHN SHERMAN, having asked President Arthur to appoint to an important position an individual who had assisted in working up a successful charge against Arthur four years ago, his excellency was moved to exclaim that Sherman has "the monumental cheek of the century."

AN estimate regarding the political complexion of the next United States senate, shows that Mahone, of Virginia, holds the balance of power. He is a dwarf, physically, and takes the place of the unwieldy Davis in pivoting American politics.

THERE is such a pressure for office—mostly internal—on the part of some of the residents of the newly organized county of Crook, that the speedy aid of the governor has been invoked to allay the trouble.

THE Austrian printers have struck to such purpose that several of the newspapers are compelled to temporarily discontinue publication.

THE net earnings of the Union Pacific Railroad company for the current year aggregate \$4,500,000.
