Iconoclastic Independents. EVEN yet some of the political bosses in the east are growling over the defection of former party organs and party orators, and say that those who refused to be whipped in to the traces are "traitors," "renegades," etc.

That such a view should be taken of such a thing shows the hold which machine politics have taken upon the minds not merely of machine politicians but of a great many other people; for a great many people who agree with outspoken men, as indeed everybody must, are nevertheless horrified at such boldness in thus "speaking out in meeting." The phrase exactly fits the case. Preachers are held to be prohibited from alluding in the pulpit to many matters of common notoriety and from taking notice of what people are doing or saying or thinking out of doors; and it is this convention which many people consider to be the explanation of the ineffectual character of modern preaching compared with the preaching of two or three generations ago.

The view of the party is of course encouraged by the elders, who only approve of such newspapers and such orators as act upon it. But there is the drawback that thick-and-thin organs of parties and thick-and-thin orators produce quite as dull reading as thick-and-thin preachers, who ignore what is in the minds of their hearers and go on to demolish men of straw of their own devising.

Our last legislature, with some provisos made the Ashland college a state Normal School. Apart from any consideration of the ethics of the action—conferring state recognition upon a sectarian institution—it need but be said that while \$45 per month is considered "good wages" for a teacher in Oregon, Normal Schools will not be a crowning benefit to the cause of education.

It is refreshing in these days when the frantic wearers of the bloody shirt are finding that once potent issue being eliminated from politics to hear of such further action on the part of former foes as now indicates fraternal feeling. Battle flags captured in the rage of conflict by northern and southern troops are being courteously returned with graceful words from the donors.
